STATE NEWS.

Mrs. Sylvia Gilbert, of Wilmington, was found dead in bed Sunday morning. Heart disease.

Campbell Landing, a near sighted man, walked into the river near Kinston last week, and was drowned.

Prof. Humphrey, the mineralogist, who has been living at Morganton for a year past, is about moving to Greensboro.

The colored military have been ordered to Raleigh to defend the colored people's Industrial Fair, to be held November 17th.

Wilkesboro Index: Col. R. F. Armfield gave our people a practical and sensible talk on the issues of the day and explained the action of the late session of Congress, at the court house in this place last Monday.

Wilmington Review: Hon. George Davis, of this city, has concluded to accept the appointment tendered him by Gov. Jarvis as one of the commissioners under the act providing for the adjustment of that portion of the State debt which is a lien upon her stock in the North Carolina Railroad. Mr. Davis will probably be chairman of the commission, as his name appears first on the list.

A negro, named Alex. Howard, was convicted in Wayne county last week of the murder of an old man named Rabel Autry, in Sampson county, in July, 1878. The object of the murder was to obtain money, and the manner of it most dastardly. The counsel appealed from the decision of the court.

The Goldsboro Messenger says he was taken back to Sampson county, where he stands indicted for burglary in connection with the killing of Mr. Autry, but while he admits his connection with the murder, in his own evidence he states that Autry's door was open, and the villain will probably cheat the gallows and get off with a term in the penitentiary.

BRIEF NEWS ITEMS.

Communism is again growing noisy in Paris.

The Georgia State school commissioner has appointed fourteen colored pupils to the Peabody scholarships in the Atlanta University.

The production of print cloths at Fall River, Massachusetts, last week shows a large increase, amounting to 130,000 pieces, which is within 10,000 of a full production.

The Cincinnati industrial exposition closed at 10 o'clock Saturday night. The total attendance has been 422,622. The cash receipts will meet all expenses and a surplus of \$10,000 will be left.

Judge Harry Hayden was shot and killed at Centralia, Wis., last Thursday by W. H. Cochran, cashier of the First National Bank of that place, for alleged intimacy with Cochran's wife.

The Georgia Senate concurs in the House resolution for the Governor to issue executions against Treasurer Renfro and his securities to recover the interest on a deposit amounting to about \$20,000.

The dry spell in the vicinity of Petersburg, Va. for the past month has caused creeks to dry up and mills to stop. The Appomattox river is so low that the cotton and flour mills cannot do more than half work.

The free baths of New York were more largely patronized this season than ever before, having been used by nearly 3,000,000 persons during the eighteen weeks between June 1st and October 3rd. Of this number 1,028,869 were females.
