



MOM WASHINGTON. Political Views from the Cabinet-A Colored Furere for Grant-Presidential Speculations, &c. Special Diamen to the Baltimore Sun.

Washing Ton, Oct. 19.—The Evening Star of Saburday has the report of a conversation with a "cabinet officer" on the result of the Ohio election. This distinguished public functionary, whose talk might seem to bear the ear-marks of Mr. Sherman, professes himself as heing not the least surprised at what being not the least surprised at what has happened. The bad record of the Democrats made a sweeping victory inevitable. The Democratic party, he said, has proved itself to be a party of no principle whatever. "It has forsaken all its own doctrines and gone chasing after anything and anybody in the hope of advancing itself. It was the party of hard money, but it abandoned its soundness in that direction and embraced all the theories and issues of inflation and wild-cat finances for the sake of catching the adherents of these financial heresies." The indictment was a just one; but supposing Mr. Sherman to have brought it, the preverb is recalled of the pot which called the kettle black. Mr. Sherman likewise, in the hope of advancing himself, has gone chasing after varying thing in the shape of finance. He has been known in the Senate to change his views on finance. financial and revenue measures within forty-eight hours, in order to catch a varying or uncertain breeze of opinion. Even now he opposes calling in and redeeming the greenbacks, not because he is not as much a hard-money man as Mr. Bayard, but because he fears lest the suggestion of such a thing would lose him favor amongst his Ohio friends. The cabinet officer is represented as being particularly severe and unjust to the South, which he claims as being utterly bad and unregenerate. The South is intolerant, he says. "They show the bully all through." This is not the feeling of the people, but of the political rulers, he thinks, however. But still, "the South has acted very badly. By its aggressiveness towards the North it has alienated the conservative element of the North, and will doubtless tramp it out altogether. It has given such encouragement and strength to the stalwart element of the Republican party that it will continue in

power. The South will go on, no doubt, until it is flat on its back." This, because the South, so he claims, has failed to recognize the North as its conqueror, and declines to acept such "forgiveness" as the "stalwarts" are willing to concede it—a forgiveness which must show itself in deeds, not words, and in this case the proper degree of humility will not be reached until the South votes the Republican ticket en masse. A cabinet officer who will use such language as is here imputed to him does not seem to be altogether fit to hold his present high position, much less that far more exalted one to which the supposed member of the cabinet is reported to be aspiring. Does Mr. Sherman, if he should be elected to the presider. cy, expect to put the South again upon its back, and to govern it upon the principle that the North was the conqueror and could dictate "anything to the conquered that might have been
