The board of directors of the Western

North Carolina Railroad, which had

been specially called to meet in this city

to consider the proposition of Mr. W. J.

Best to purchase that road, assembled

in the treasurer's office at the capitol

Tuesday afternoon. The following mem-

A. M. Fowler. Mr. Best, the trustee

was thus present save Mr. Shober.

Major Wilson was chairman of the

meeting and called it to order. Messrs.

C. M. Cook and William Johnston, of

the State board of internal improve-

ments, were invited to participate in

the meeting.

A communication was read from Gov.

Jarvis, transmitting the proposition for

protect the \$500,000 of mortgage bonds

now out; to issue to the State \$500,000

of mortgage bonds in payment for the

amount expended by the State since

the sale of the road, for the support of

convicts, purchase of iron and interest

on the \$500,000; and to deposit with

the State treasurer \$500,000, which, in

case he fails to comply with his pro-

position, shall be forfeited to the State

and may then be used to defray the ex-

penses of the session of the Legislature;
