GORDON RESIGNS.

A Sudden Sensation in Politics. The Resignation of Georgia Politician Gordon, from the Senate, has caused a sensation in the South.

GENERAL GORDON'S RESIGNATION. UNITED STATES SENATE CHAMBER, Washington, D. C., May 16, 1880.—To His Excellency, Governor A. H. Colquitt, Atlanta, Ga.—Sir: I hereby tender to you my resignation as United States Senator from Georgia.

Since April, 1861—for nearly twenty years—my life has been one of incessant anxiety and of great labor. For more than one-half of that long period, either in war or in public office, my energies have been devoted to what I conceived to be the welfare of the Southern people and the best interests of the whole country.

Immediately upon the receipt of the foregoing letter, Governor Colquitt sent the following dispatch, hoping to procure its withdrawal:

May 18, 1880.—General John B. Gordon, Washington, D. C.: I believe of the people of Georgia, I beg that you recall your resignation. If you cannot do so unconditionally, withhold it, at least, until the meeting of the general assembly.

GENERAL GORDON'S REPLY. WASHINGTON, D. C., May 19, 1880.—Governor A. H. Colquitt: In response to your flattering request that I withdraw my resignation, I beg to say that, though anxious to oblige, I feel constrained to decline.

EX-GOVERNOR BROWN TO SUCCEED SENATOR GORDON. NASHVILLE, TENN., May 19, 1880.—Ex-Governor Joseph E. Brown, of Georgia, who is here, received a dispatch tonight announcing his appointment to the United States Senate from Georgia, vice Senator Gordon, resigned. Mr. Brown accepts.

GENERAL GORDON WILL OCCUPY HIS SEAT UNTIL HIS SUCCESSOR ARRIVES. WASHINGTON, May 20.—Senator Gordon was in his seat in the Senate to-day as usual and will continue to occupy it until his newly appointed successor shall arrive from Georgia, which will probably be next Monday.

FORTY-SIXTH CONGRESS.

Proceedings of Thursday's Session. WASHINGTON, May 20.—SENATE.—Morgan, from the select committee on counting the electoral vote, reported with amendments the bill introduced by the conference on the constitution of the United States in reference to elections of President and Vice-President of the United States.

Kellogg took the floor and reviewed the evidence, claiming that the affidavits against him were proved to be forgeries, that the witnesses to bribery were shown to be perjurers, and that the evidence in his favor was uncontradicted and suppressed in making the report.

He translated some of the telegrams: "It is important that the best means be taken to prevent the publication of the contents of the telegrams."

There was nothing wrong in the telegrams before, and failing an opportunity, he told a man who he knew would tell Hill how to translate them. Hill then told the Senate an expert had deciphered them for him. Hill knew Rose did not mean Marks, but said it did in order to support his theory that the witnesses favoring Kellogg were put in to the custom house. He admitted the correctness of Hill's reading of the dispatch telling Badger to send appointees corroborating Murray and the money he ready at the hotel, was sent corroborative witnesses as a quorum in the joint assembly.

PHILADELPHIA LABOR CONVENTION. What the Party Will do in Case an Acceptable Candidate is Not Nominated at Chicago.

PHILADELPHIA, May 21.—Last evening a meeting of the prominent labor men of Philadelphia was held for the purpose of deciding upon candidates for President and Vice-President, which are to be nominated at the national convention in Chicago.

There were present representatives from Maine, Massachusetts, New York, Ohio, Indiana, Ohio, Wisconsin, Virginia, Maryland, New Jersey, North Carolina and Colorado, as well as Pennsylvania.

As a test of the sentiment of the convention a general labor resolution will be presented to that body binding the convention to support only a man thoroughly identified with the labor party.

The name of Sam J. Randall was brought up in the meeting, and in the event of his nomination by the Democratic party and no satisfactory arrangement being made, the delegates were in favor of centering their support upon the speaker.
