The Grant and Anti-Grant Men in Conference-The Temporary Organization Being Arranged--- A Hitch in the Proceedings.

NEW YORK, May 31.—A Chicago special says Conkling and Logan for Grant, Dennison and Foster for Sherman, Hamlin and W. E. Chandler for Blaine, held a conference last evening, lasting five hours. The object was to see if all the parties could not agree to a temporary organization. After a full explanation on the part of those opposed to the unit rule of their position and strength, of which they felt sure, Conkling yielded the naming of the temporary chairman to the anti-Grant men, pledging himself that Cameron would carry out the agreement in good faith. This extended to an agreement not to move a substitute for the one named by the committee for chairman. The names of Geo. F. Hoar and Ex-Bepresentative Brandige, of Connecti-cut, will be proposed to the simulties to-night. After Conkling had pledged

his associates to yielding the temporary chairman to the anti-Grant men, the representatives of the latter took a list of the names submitted over to Logan, Cameron and their associates, and they promptly rejected the three names submitted by the Sherman and Blaine men, named Hoar, Brandige and Ex-Senator Mitchell, of Oregon, and declared they would only accept the name of J. Morrison Harris, of Maryland, suggested by Conkling. He was vouched for by the latter as a Sherman man and as against the unit rule. The Blaine and Sherman men will not agree to him for the reason that for years he had been a Democrat, and when a candidate for Governor declared he owed no alle-




