How They bre conducted Advantages They Possess as Presented by One Engaged in the Work. The following letter received by a gentleman in this city was sent to THE OBSERVER with a request that it be published. The author is Prof. Alexander McIver, principal of the graded

most distinguished and successful edu cutors in the State of the morning than GREENSBORO, April 10, 1880.—A graded school is one in which pupils are classified according to their ages and attainments, and in which pupils of similar attainments are taught together. Sup-pose foot or fivehundred publis of vari-ous ages and attainments are to be organized into a school and taught in all the branches of a common school education. How is it to be done? Divide the whole number of pupils

into ten equal classes, putting in each class pupils of like ages and attainments and provide a separate room and a teacher for each class. At first the studies assigned to each class should be Leaves for Statesville...... 7.30 a. m rrives from Statesville..... 7.00 p. m subspled to the wants and necessities of pupils. But after a few years, the course may be so arranged that the studies of one class shall be a step, gradus to those of the next higher. The classes are therefore called grades, and the school thus organized a graded school, The essential idea, as the name implies, is that of an orderly succession of ascending steps, each of which is a preparation for the one which follows. Each of these steps consists in certain degrees of mental development and a competent knowledge of certain sub jects of instruction. The time allotted to each grade is generally five months; and at the end of this time all pupils who are thoroughly proficient in the studies of the grade are advanced to the next higher; but those who are not proficient are required to go over the course of the same grade again. Pupils who are industrious, punctual, and apt to

are industrious, punctual, and apt to learn, may at any time when their attainments justify it, be promoted to a higher grade. Thus the way is always open for the meritorious. The children of the rich and the poor are thaught together and on equal terms. They learn to rely upon good conduct and upon good conduct alone, for success. Self-reliance is taught, and character is formed. formed.

The advantages of such a school must be obvious to every one. It is an application of the great law of division of labor to the work of teaching. The teacher's time, talents, and energies are concentrated upon a single class and upon a limited range of duties, and he may therefore excel in his work. The principal or superintendent of such a school should be a man of high attainments in his profession, and his skill will very soon manifest itself in every part of the work and in every grade of the school. He will instruct and train

the teachers in their work, and retain only those who are found to be industrious, energetic, and competent. Such an organization will necessarily make a good school in a very short time. 
