SCENE IN THE CONVENTION.
Something that Rivalled Pandemonium.

CHICAGO, June 7.—The greatest scene which ever occurred in a national convention took place here at 12 o'clock this morning, amounting almost to a battle between the contending factions. It was so prolonged and excited that the clock in the hall stopped at 12:05, and the terror-stricken in their seats. Men and women were into hysterics and rushed around the hall in a panic.

WILD WOMEN, TOO.
Ten thousand people were on their feet, standing upon tables and chairs and the backs of the benches, waving handkerchiefs, caps, hats, umbrellas, overcoats, shawls, papers, in fact everything that could be seen or used to add to the confusion and excitement. The flags with which the building is decorated were torn down and waved aloft. Crazy women tore off their bonnets and swung them by their strings; and crazy men pulled their coats from their backs and waved them in the air. The noise was absolutely deafening; and no one knows till he hears it how much noise ten thousand people can make, shouting at the top of their lungs, pounding the floor with their feet, and banging the resonant pine benches with boards torn from the backs and arms. It was Bedlam, and beyond Bedlam. It was like nothing that was ever seen or described, and any attempt to describe it would be a failure.

REPORTERS COOL, AS USUAL.
The delegates began to sing "John Brown" and "Rally Round the Flag," and in all that yelling, rapping, waving, crowd, the only men who kept quiet were the reporters, who were compelled, in the midst of the deafening turmoil, to attend to the business of furnishing the news for the public. It was midnight when the first thunder-peal was heard, and it was half an hour after 1 o'clock when the chairman began to show that he still lived by hammering the desk with the formidable gavel. He could not sit on the end of it, and immediately the delegates from Maine, California, Nebraska, Nevada, Kansas, Virginia and New Mexico, bearing aloft the banners which designated their respective States, marched around the hall.

PEACE AT LAST.
Doubtless the disorder would have lasted all night had not Gen. Rain, with an unexpected sagacity, proposed three cheers for the victorious candidate. This parting volley of sounds seemed to satisfy the frenzied assemblage, and Mr. Storrer finished his speech in careful sentences, fearful that he might create another scene like the one which he had so ably succeeded in producing. There never was, and perhaps, unless in the same body, possibly never will be, such another spectacle. In fact, the scene put Grant and Blaine in a humiliating position, and the speeches after this will be tame in comparison.

The Royal Standard,
Good Words.
The royal standard is never carried into action, even though the sovereign in person commands the army. A heraldic manuscript of the sixteenth century prescribes that the royal standard shall be set before the king's pavilion or tent, and not to be borne in battle, and to be in length eleven yards. The royal standard is never hoisted in ships except when the monarch is on board, or a member of the royal family (other than the Prince of Wales). When the latter is on board his own standard is hoisted. It is the same as that of the queen, except that it bears a label of three points, with the arms of Saxony, an emblem of pretence. Whether the sovereign is residing the royal standard is hoisted; and on royal anniversaries or state occasions it is hoisted on the fortresses or stations—home and foreign—specified in the queen's regulations, but nowhere else.

LIKE STRASBURG'S CLOCK.
Save that the Apostles are Replaced by the Presidents and Mr. Hayes.

On the stage of Tammany Hall, last night, stood an immense clock. Its face indicated the local time, the Chicago time in time between the large cities of the world, the day of the week, calendar day of the month, months and seasons of the year, and the signs of the zodiac. Striding out from the face, and supported by wires, were a number of gold and silver globes, representing the principal primary planets, including the earth swinging on its imaginary axis. These and the series of clocks ranged around the dial were worked by a huge pendulum that swung under the picture. So nice has been the calculation and so ingenious the mechanism that the members of the planetary and solar systems move, with the same relative speed with regard to each other as do their heavenly prototypes. In order to give an illustration of this the movement of the bodies was exaggerated, last evening, by Mr. Felix Meyer, the inventor. The earth revolved on its axis, and in its orbit, with the same movement around the sun. The moon revolved about the earth, and with it around the sun. Then could be plainly seen the reason of the quarterings of the moon and of its total obscuration when the earth interposed its globe and cut off the sunlight from it. The planets, too, moved gracefully around the sun. It was explained that Mercury would, by means of the mechanism, make one revolution around the sun in 88 days, Venus in 224 days, Mars in 686 days, Vesta in 1,327 days, Juno in 1,533 days, Ceres in 1,881 days, Jupiter in 4,332 days, Saturn in 10,758 days, and Uranus in 30,688 days. The crank attachment of the clock was set so that the President revolved a day, for sixteen days and eight hours, a complete revolution of the planet Uranus around the sun would be made.

What Mr. Seymour's Home Paper Says of Him.

An officer of Congress from Utica handed me to-day the following from the Utica Morning Herald, with the request that I send it to the Dispatch for publication. The Herald is Republican, but the citizens of Utica, without regard to party, love Mr. Seymour, and regard him as one of the purest and wisest of living statesmen. It says:
"Hon. Horatio Seymour's seventieth birthday anniversary, Monday, was observed by Albany friends sending him a very beautiful clock for his library. He planted two trees on the lawn in the rear of the old homestead on Whitehall street, in honor of his brother, and then with his wife entertained a party of friends at his country home in Deerfield. Governor Seymour never appeared better than now. He seems to have grown younger every year since he withdrew from politics. It is a rare pleasure to meet him in his daily visits to the city, and listen to his conversation upon all conceivable subjects which add to the comfort and happiness of humanity, excite new interests and pride in their homes, and for their country, and give all good reasons for being glad that they are alive to enjoy all the good things that they deserve.

Effect of Perfumery on Health.
An Italian professor has made some very agreeable medical researches, resulting in the discovery that vegetable perfumes exercise a positively healthful influence on the atmosphere, converting its oxygen into ozone, and thus increasing its oxidizing influences. The essences found to develop the largest quantity of ozone are those of the cherry, laurel, clover, lavender, mint, juniper, fennel and hyacinth. These should give it in similar quantities are anise, nutmeg and thyme. The flowers of the narcissus, hyacinth, mignonette, heliotrope and Lily-of-the-valley develop ozone in closed vessels. Flowers destitute of perfume absorb oxygen, and those which have slight perfume develop it only in small quantities. Reasoning from these facts, the professor recommended the cultivation of flowers in marshy districts, and in all places infested with animal emanations, on account of the powerful oxidizing influences of ozone. The inhabitants of such regions should, he says, surround their houses with beds of the most odorous flowers.

Killed at Hamburg.

On Monday afternoon, during the hearing of a case before the intendant and wardens of the town of Hamburg, a white woman named Sally Shinall, made use of offensive language and so interrupted the court that she was ordered in contempt and ordered to be taken to the lock-up. The town marshal, named Creighton Matheny, took charge of her and started with her to the guard house. On the way he struck her a blow on the head with a club, of iron, not a stick. Friday, the marshal and his friends say that she resisted violently and he was obliged to strike her. The friends of the woman say that she did not resist, but merely sat down on the ground and refused to go and that thereupon the officer struck her.

Gordon in Augusta—A Salute of Thirteen Guns in His Honor.
Augusta, June 5.—General Gordon, ex-United States Senator, arrived in Augusta this afternoon. A salute of thirteen guns was fired by the local artillery company in honor of his arrival. He was welcomed to the city by Col. C. C. Jones, president of the Confederate Survivors' Association. General Gordon spoke at the city hall to a very large audience. He explained the reasons for his resignation and denied the charge that there had been any bargain and sale. He resigned, he said, because he had long desired to leave public life and because a lucrative position had been offered him. He defended the course of Governor Colquitt.
