Effect of Perfumery on Health. An Italian mofessor has made some very agreeable medical researches, resulting in the discovery that vegetable perfumes exercise a positively healthful influence on the atmosphere, converting its oxygen into ozone, and thus increasing its oxidizing influences. The essences found to develope the largest quantity of ozone are those of the cherry, laurel, clover, lavender, mint, juniper, fennel and bergamot; those that give it in similar quantities are anise, nutmeg and thyme. The flowers of the narcissus, hyacinth, mignonette, helictrope and hily-of-the-valley develope ozone in closed vessels. Flowers desti-tute of perfume do not develope it, and those which have slight perfume devel-ope it only in small quantities. Reasoning from these facts, the professor recommended the cultivation of flowers in marshy districts, and in all places infested with animal emanations, on account of the powerful exidizing influences of ozone.
