PRESIDENTIAL PARDONS. Washington, August 25.—The announcement that the President will leave here this week to be absent for two months has caused telegrams to pour in from all sections of the country asking for action on various small mat-ters before he leaves. Particularly is this so in reference to pardon cases, a large number of which have been under consideration at the Attorney General's office for some weeks past. The majority of these applications are for the pardon of men convicted of defrauding the revenue or passing counterfeit money. Of the first-named it is said at the Department of Justice that the practice had become very common on the part of United States district attorneys to prosecute men for defraud torneys to prosecute men for defrauding the revenue and secure a convic-tion when the cases ought never to have gone to trial at all, the evidence showing that the accused were not guilty intentionally, but through ignorance of the law. The prosecuting officer, instead of entering a nolle pros, and saying the government costs, goes ahead and forces a conviction in order to obtain his fees, and then asks the presiding judge to suspend sentence until an application for a pardon can be made. This abuse has grown to such an extent as to attract the attention of the authorities here and cause them to consider how to check it. The Treasury Department bought \$2,500,000 of bonds for the sinking fund to-day, making \$7,500,000 purchased during the present month. It is announced authoritatively that another purchase will be made next week, making \$10,000,000 in all during the month of August.
