

High Tide of Immigration

New York Herald. The year 1880 is likely to be a memorable one in the annals of immigration. It was in that year that the emigrant tide from Europe to these shores touched the highest mark ever known. In 1880, 220,800 aliens were landed at Castle Garden. The greatest number reached in any preceding year was 319,200 in 1854. These figures are for New York alone, the great gate through which aliens enter the country. Including

in 1877. From the close of the war down to 1873 the number of aliens landed at Castle Garden did not fall below 200,000 in any year. But from 267,-000 in 1873 it drepped to 149,000 in 1874, 84,000 in 1875, 68,000 in 1876 and 45,000 in 1877. It then rose to 76,000 in 1878, 185, 000 in 1879 and nearly 821,000 in 1880.
