We learn from Washington that our distinguished fellow-citizen, Mr. Jay Gould, will soon take his seat as an As-sociate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States. Mr. Gould will rank among the able men on the bench. As a man of letters he is not unknown to fame. In early youth his precocious talent discovered tself in a history of his native county. At present he enjoys the unprecedent-ed distinction of being the reputed head of two metropolitan dailies of dif-
