Whatever is done by this committee must be ratified by the eastern section. which represents British and Continental Methodism. The main business of the general committee, of which this is a branch, is to prepare and publish a scheme of business or programme of exercises for the Ecumenical Conference, and to make all preliminary preparations for its meeting. The conference will be held in the city Read Chapel. London, the first week in September. Its powers will not be legislative, the main object being to secure co-operation of the different branches of the church in the great work of saving
