It is probably not necessary to maintain in an enlightened community the efficacy of vaccination as a preventive of small-pox; it has been used for a century-since its discovery by Jenner -and its protective power has been established beyond any sort of reasonable controversy. Careless and indifferent as are men to the blessings of that discovery, the average death rate from small-pox throughout the world has decreased enormously, and in proportion to the use of good vaccine matter. In Europe the small-pox death rate is less than one-tenth what it was at the end of the last century, and the same relative decrease has taken place in this country. A medical authority, whose figures on this subject we have recently obtained, says with the use of good virus and the necessary precautions, there ought not to be over one failure to protect in every 170 cases. In fifty thousand cases examined in Lendon in 1863, it was found in every thousand children who had been vaccinated, the percentage of small-pox was

We believe there has been no systematic vaccination in Charlotte in twelve years, nor, for that matter, in any other town in North Carolina. Greater negligence of a reasonable precaution is hardly to be equaled anywhere else. The expense will be light, if the proper system is inaugurated, and once the vaccination is complete, there will be no occasion to repeat it for years.
