THE SALE OF LIQUOR
Discussed in the House of Representatives.

The special order in the House of Representatives of the State Legislature Tuesday, was the Senate bill to regulate the sale of liquors in this State.

After several amendments had been sent forward, Mr. Bowman called the previous question. The call was not sustained.
