A GIGANTIC ROBBERY.

Nearly One Million Dollars in Bonds Carried Off--- A Quantity of Jewelry Stolen.

New York Herald, 17th. One of the most startling and extensive robberies that have ever occured in this city was perpetrated yesterday, under circumstances which evidence almost unparalleled boldness and skill on the part of the thieves. In broad day-light two or more men succeeded in en-tering a large apartment house filled with people, on a populous street, evad-ing the servants with which the house was supplied, and breaking into the apartments of one of the occupants car-ried off bonds, certificates, of stock and ried off bonds, certificates of stock and jewelry to the value of nearly \$1,000,-000. After completely ransacking the rooms in the absence of the occupants, they escaped without detection with their valuable booty and left absolutely no trace behind them.

HOW THE ROBBERY WAS EFFECTED. Mr. Abram E. Simons, a stationer and printer, doing business at No. 62
John street, resides with his wife in a
suit of rooms on the second floor in the
large apartment house at No. 177 East Seventy-second street. Between 5 and 6 o'clock last evening Mr. Simons and his wife were absent from home for a short time. On their return they found that their rooms had been broken open and literally every article of furniture and every closet or other receptacle where valuables could have been concealed, had been thoroughly ransacked. Every room was in confusion and the floors were covered with the contents of the drawers of the bureaus and secretaries. Mr. Simons had been printing the bonds and stock certificates for some railroad company or companies, whose names have not been learned, and nearly \$1,000,000 worth of these securities he had taken to his rooms for safe keeping and concealment. They were unsigned by the proper officers, but it is said were otherwise complete. Every one of these bonds and certificates were taken, together with \$2,000 worth of jewels and valuables

belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Simons. AN INGENIOUS DEVICE. An investigation by the detectives, who were speedily summoned, satisfied them that the thieves had evidently entered the house by the basement doors and climbed into the enclosure where Lynchburg. the dumb waiter runs. By means of this machine they had hoisted them-selves up to the second floor, where they had easily broken down the frail doors of the closet opening into Mr. Simon's kitchen from the lift or dumb waiter, which is used for sending coal, ashes, food, garbage, etc., to and from the cellar. Once in the apartment they seemed to know where to look for their booty, and had made the most of their time and escaped successfully by the Mr. A. R. 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
