A GIGANTIC ROBBERY.

Nearly One Million Dollars in Bonds
Carried Off—A Quantity of Jewelry
Stolen.
New York Herald, 17th.
One of the most startling and extensive
robberies that have ever occurred
in this city was perpetrated yesterday,
under circumstances which evidence al-
most unparalleled boldness and skill on
the part of the thieves. The proceed-
ings were as follows: A party of about
eight or more men succeeded in enter-
ing a large apartment house filled
with people, on a populous street, evad-
ing the servants with which the house
was supplied, and breaking into the
apartments of one of the occupants
carried off bonds, certificates of stock
and jewelry to the value of nearly \$1,000,000.
After completely ransacking the
rooms in the absence of the occu-
pants, they escaped without detection
with their valuable booty and left abso-
lutely no trace behind them.

HOW THE ROBBERY WAS EFFECTED.
Mr. Abram E. Simons, a stationer
and printer, doing business at No. 62
John street, resides with his wife in a
suit of rooms on the second floor in the
large apartment house at No. 177 East
Seventy-second street. Between 5 and 6
o'clock last evening Mr. Simons and
his wife were absent from home for a
short time. On their return they found
that the rooms had been broken open
and literally every article of furniture
and every closet or other receptacle
where valuables could have been con-
cealed, had been thoroughly ransacked.
Every room was in confusion and the
contents of the drawers of the bureau
and the drawers of the bureau and secre-
taries. Mr. Simons had been printing
the bonds and stock certificates for
some railroad company or companies,
whose names have not been learned,
and nearly \$1,000,000 worth of these
certificates had taken to his rooms
for safe keeping and concealment.
They were unsigned by the proper offi-
cers, but it is said were otherwise com-
plete. Every one of these bonds and
certificates taken together were worth
\$2,000,000 of jewels and valuables
belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Simons.

AN INGENUOUS DEVICE.
An investigation by the detectives,
who were speedily summoned, satisfied
them that the thieves had evidently en-
tered the house by the basement doors
and climbed into the enclosure where
the dumb waiter runs. By means of
this machine they had hoisted them-
selves up to the second floor, where
they had easily broken down the frail
doors of the closet opening into Mr.
Simons' kitchen from the lift or dumb
waiter, which is used for sending coal,
ashes, food, garbage, etc., to and from
the cellar. Once in the apartment they
seemed to know where to look for their
booty, and had made the most of their
time and escaped successfully by the
same way in which they had entered.

Gatherings from the State Papers.
Raleigh News and Observer: At 7
o'clock last evening, as John Hubbard,
keeper of the county work house, which
is about six miles from the city, opened
the door of the building, there was a
rush of prisoners from the interior, and
in an instant he was knocked down
and trampled on by the flying man.
All were negroes. Before the last man
had gone many yards from the door,
Keeper Hubbard, who is a one-legged
man and was a Confederate soldier, re-
covered his footing, and grasping his
shot-gun, fired at Leonard Rand, the
rear-most prisoner. The charge of shot
took effect in his head, causing instant
death. The other fugitives escaped.
The authorities here were notified last
evening.
