DANGER IN BABY CARRIAGES. Infants More Healthy When Carried in the Arms of Nurses.

The physiological or hygienic effect of the baby carriage on the child has been recently considered by Dr. Henry A. Smith, in a paper read before the Philadelphia County Medical Society. Inquiry among physicians tends to sustain many of Dr. Smith's conclusions. Divested of technicalities, the results, of the prestigation are that important musinvestigation are that important muscalar functions are impaired, particularly those of the spine and abdomen, and that the growth and proper development of the child are retarded greatly by the constant or injudicious use of

Alleged New Railway Scheme in North Carolina. Dispatch to New York Herald.

FAYETTEVILLE, N. C., March 26 .-Quite a ripple of excitement was created here yesterday by the appearance on our streets of Mr. L. W. Humphrey, a Former railroad president in this State. who was understood to represent Jay Gould, and was said to be negotiating for the purchase of the Fayetteville and Florence Railroad. Rumor says that Gould proposes to build a road from Norfolk, Va., via Fayetteville to Florence. Should such a road be consummented it is said this would give Gould the shortest and most direct through railroad route from the Atlantic to the Pacific, which line will run through the whole cotton belt, with a direct outlet to Europe at Norfolk. There is a charter for the Fayetteville and Florence Railroad, grading on which was done eight or nine years ago from Fayette-ville to Shoe Heel, on the Carolina Central road. Fresh-Water Spring in the Atlantic. One of the most remarkable displays of nature may be seen on the Atlantic coast eighteen miles south of St. Au-gustine. Off Matanzas Inlet, and force miles from shore, a mammoth fresh-water spring gurgles up from the depth of the ocean with such force and vol-ume as to attract the attention of all ume as to attract the attention of all who come in its immediate vicinity. This fountain is large, beld and turbulent. It is noticeable to fishermen and others passing in small boats along near the shore. For many years this wonderful and mysterious freak of nature has been known to the people of St. Augustine and those living along the shore, and some of the superstitious ones have been taught to regard it with a kind of reverential awe, or holy horror, as the abode of supernatural influences. When the waters of the ocean in its vicinity are otherwise calm and tranquil the upheaving and troubled appearance of the water shows unmis-takable evidences of internal commotions. An area of about half an acre shows this troubled appearance-something smilar to the boiling of a washerwoman's kettle. Six or eight years ago Commodore Hitchcock, of the United States coast survey, was passing this place, and his attention was directed to the spring by the restless upheavings of the water, which threw his ship from her course as she entered the spring. His curiesity becoming excited by this circumstance, he set to work to examine its surroundings, and found six fathoms of water everywhere in the vicinity, while the spring itself was al-

Deposits for Five per Cont, Pund.

The following circular relative to the revocation of circular authorizing deposits for five per cent fund to be made by check payable to assistant treasurer in New York, has been issued by the United States Treasurer:

Circular No. 37, of March 5, 1879, authorizing national banks to reimburse the Treasurer of the United States by checks payable to the order of the assistant treasurer of the United States in New York for their circulating notes redeemed, is hereby revoked to take effect April 1, 1881. After that date reimbursement must be made in one of the following ways: 1, By a deposit of United States notes with the assistant treasurer of the United States in New York, Boston, Philadelphia, New Orleans, Baltimore, Chicago, Cincinnati, St. Louis or San Francisco, on account of the five per cent. fund. Banks not St. Louis or San Francisco, on account of the five per cent. fund. Banks not situated in one of the above named cities should make the deposit through their correspondents. The certificate of deposit must be forwarded directly to the Treasurer of the United States by the bank making the deposit. 2. By a remittance of United States notes, addressed to the Treasurer of the United States, marked "United States notes to credit of five per cent, fund." The express charges, if not prepaid, will be depress charges, if not prepaid, will be deducted from the proceeds of the remittance at government contract rates.
