ITEMS OF INTEREST.

It is said by the New York Bulletin that, as matters now stand, not only is New York the home of hundreds of irresponsible assessment life insurance associations, but the State is also the happy hunting-ground of hordes of other State co-operatives, whose opera-tions are little less than highway reb-bery in effect, and to some of whom the characterization of "murder-mills" has been fairly attached.

The Textile Record states it as an indisputable fact that cetten is, for the time at least, the ascendant interest of the country. The export values of \$237,652,005 attained in 1880 are likely. to be increased, according to the Record, to \$250,000,000 in 1881, and the domestic manufacture will be nearly 2,000,000 bales, and valued (at 10 cents the pound and 450 pounds to the bale) at \$90,000,000.
