NEWS OF INTEREST.

Chattanooga has a population of 15,164, an increase of 2,285 over the directory of last year.

The thieves who robbed General Grant's baggage and stole his badges and other jewelry apparently did not succeed in capturing his bundle of dead head passes.

In removing two bodies from contiguous graves in the cemetery at Idaville, Ind., it was found that nothing was left of one but bones, while the other had turned to flint and weighed three hundred pounds.

The streets of Philadelphia are so very filthy that the prediction is made that the Hon. G. William Childs will be compelled to employ a short hand man in the composition of his mortuary lyrics.—Advertiser.

The Shenandoah Valley Railroad Company has taken option on 700 acres of land near Big Lick, Va., from \$70 to \$300 per acre. These lands are to be sold by the company to parties who wish to build furnace, rolling mills, &c., at the same prices paid by the company for them.

England is getting rather more American rivalry than she wants. Our horses win her greatest stakes, Hanlan outrows her oarsmen, and Dr. Carver outshoots her best marksmen. She has a surfboat, and now on a technicality the Henry is wards protest to keep the Cornell crew out of the coming race. The Cornell boys will soon be on the ground, and if the British love of fair play is not extinct they will be allowed a chance to show what they can do.

A noteworthy feature in the consumption of manufactured iron is the iron sleeper. The authorities had not been used experimentally, but in Belgium and Germany it has been employed for a considerable time. In the past two years it is calculated that nearly 130,000 tons have been placed on the German railways. It is only natural to suppose that its adoption will follow in other countries, and afford a large employment to mills engaged in its manufacture.

Boston seems to be in earnest in working up the World's Fair project. A second meeting to push the project has been held, and was attended by many of the wealthiest citizens of the city, who promised liberal support. Should Boston make this movement a success, she will have good cause to crow over New York City.

During an existence of forty years Iowa City has never had its houses numbered. The authorities had not the enterprise to undertake the work, although the city has something like ten thousand population. The other day a local newspaper took up the matter and had twenty-five hundred houses numbered at its expense. The newspapers are depended upon for a great deal these days.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Neiman were struck and killed by lightning Thursday, while driving home near Des Plaines, Ill., during a heavy thunderstorm. The horse attached to their buggy was also killed. When found they were both seated upright in the buggy, and Mrs. Neiman's dress had taken fire and burned nearly off. There were no marks on her person.

California's Wool Crop. Wilmington Star.

Think of California producing between fifty and sixty million pounds of wool! How many pounds are clipped in North Carolina, a State so admirably adapted to sheep raising? Possibly a million or so. The census will tell us after a while. To show that sheep can be raised with ease and profit, we may mention that Chatham reports some fourteen thousand head. Union some twelve thousand, Randolph some eleven thousand, Haywood 6,400, Macon 7,680, Madison 6,012, Moore 7,720, Orange 7,580, Granville 6,582. Coming towards the ocean we find Camden with 500, Carteret 1,100, Craven nearly 2,000, Duplin nearly 5,000, Onslow 2,518, Sampson nearly 8,000, and so on. Let us raise more sheep. But how can this be done with a hostile Legislature to prevent it? When will the people study their own interests more closely?

A Thoroughly Merited Kick. Palladium Times.

The one thoroughly merited kick received by Conkling since the decline of his power is that given by ex-President Hayes. Conkling knows that Hayes wasn't elected President, and Hayes knows that Conkling knows the facts, and that Conkling intended to prevent the consummation of the fraud, but that he betrayed himself and his convictions in weakness at the last moment. The Hayes kick at the wounded Hon has the merit of retributive justice. Conkling invited the contempt of a fraudulent President when he confessed the fraud and failed to crush it and its pretender.

Rumors of Crookedness. Numerous rumors were afloat about the Treasury Department relative to the probable outcome of the investigation which is now in progress in the custody of the office. The committee is still at work and will be for some time yet, and are very reticent as to what has been discovered. It is understood that a report will be prepared and submitted to Secretary Winthrop on his return from the West. It is stated that one of the officials interested in the result of the investigation stated to the committee that persons higher in authority than he were responsible for all that had been done by him, and the impression prevails that several removals will be recommended.

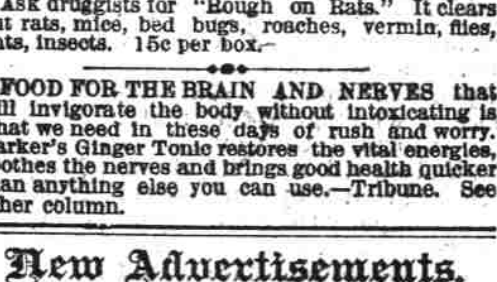

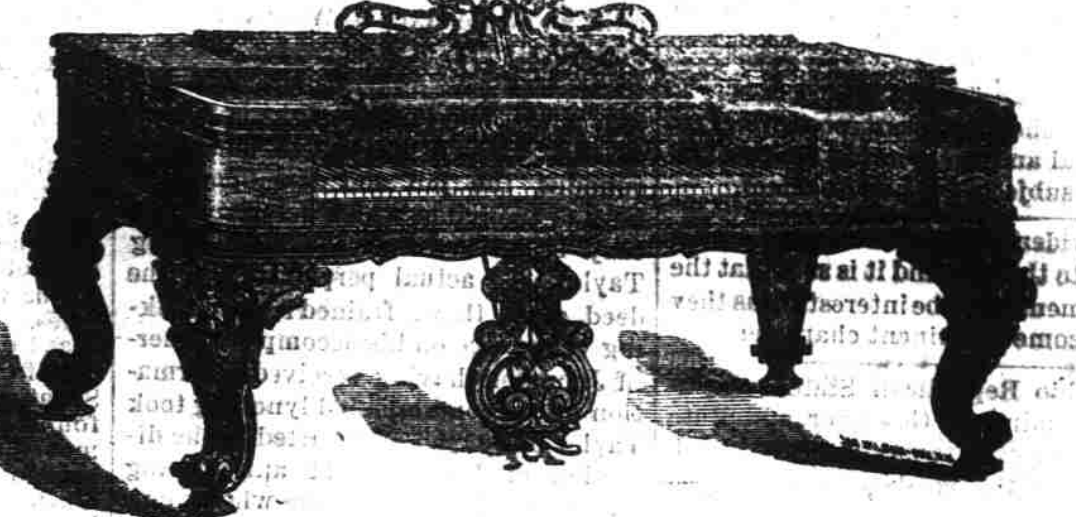

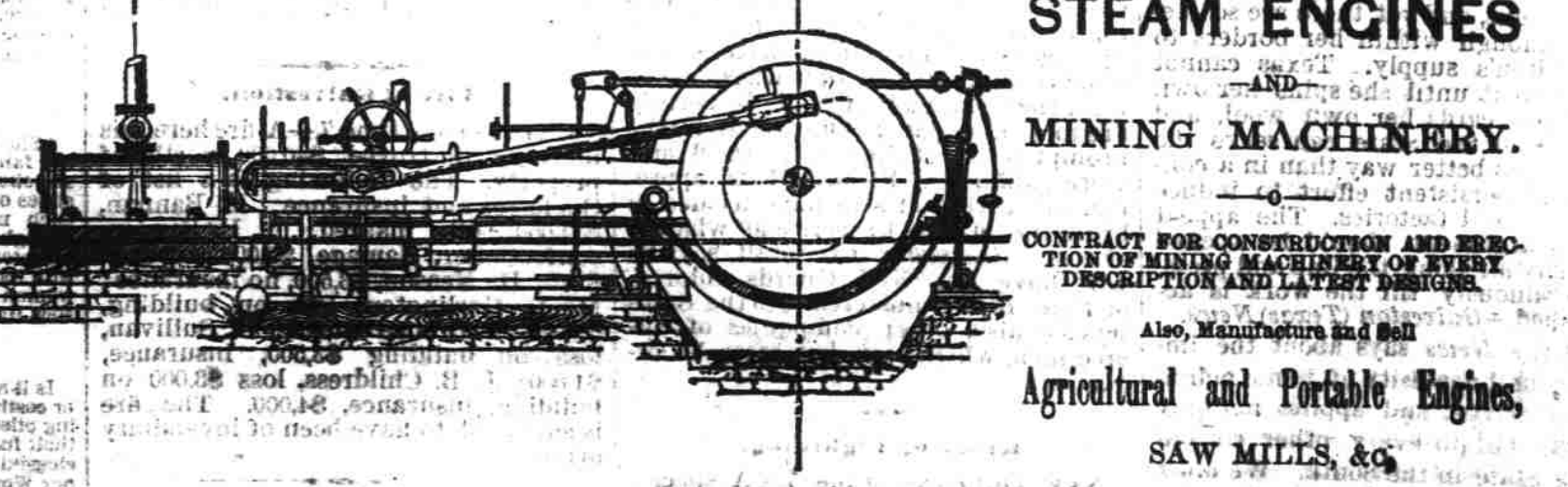
