A Reported Lynching.

It is rumored that the lynching of a colored man occurred near Gaffney City night before last. When the passenger train, bound to this city, reached that station at 10 o'clock the place was found to be in a high state of excitement. The passengers were told that a colored man had been interrupted ed and frustrated in a diabolical attempt upon the person of a young lady, at the time, but the citizens turned out in a body and succeeded in capturing him. They had just returned without him, but apparently highly satisfied with the result of their hunt, and fears were entertained that the negro had paid for his attempted crime with his life.

According to appointment John Williamson, a colored orator from Raleigh, under the auspices of the executive committee of the county prohibitory society, appeared at the opera house last night and addressed a large audience of white and colored citizens. He was introduced by Col. Jno. E. Brown, chairman of the committee, and proceeded to entertain his auditors with an exceedingly practical and pleasing speech, drawing his illustrations from every day life and clothing them in the homely, unstudied language by which they could be best appreciated by those to whom he more preciated by those to whom he more particularly addressed himself—the colored portion of his listeners. These were attentive throughout and responded to his frequently well-turned and forcible points with rapturous applause. The effect of the speech was considerable, and it is thought will result in much good for the cause in the county.

ix Persons Struck by Lightning in Spartanburg-Damage in Other Places. Yesterday afternoon, about half-past

o'clock, in advance of a refreshing rain which visited the city, a high wind suddeniy swept through the streets, raising the dust in clouds, slamming house doors and breaking glasses out of windows in several places. The hurricane seemed to be the advance courier of a more violent storm which it had preceded.

This impression was confirmed later in the afternoon when news reached the city over the wires of its devastations in other places.

In Spartanburg, S. C., the storm was particularly severe, being accompanied with vivid flashes of lightning, one of which struck a dwelling in which were five people, two of whom, a Mrs. Revan and daughter, were killed instantly, and the other three severely injured.

Mr. Revan, who bore the relation of husband and father of the two who were killed, was in another portion of the town and was also injured by the lightning.

by Mr. F. W. Ahrens, of this city, for a gentleman in that town, was entirely destroyed, it is understood. At Morrow's turnout, houses were unroofed and chimneys and trees were blown down.

The storm seems to have been very general and to have prevailed over a wide extent of territory. The damage cannot be estimated until the reports are in fuller.
