Complaints were made to Justice Waring against Mr. Fritz Vogel, for committing a nuisance by means of his butcher-pen in the northern part of the city. A Reported Lynching.

It is rumored that the lynching of a colored man occurred near Gaffney City night before last. When the passenger train, bound to this city, reached that station at 10 o'clock the place was found to be in a high state of excitement. The passengers were told that a colored man had been interrupted and frustrated in a diabolical attempt upon the person of a young lady, near that place, by the opportune appearance of a white man, who had stepped at the time, but the citizens had turned out in a body and succeeded in capturing him. They had just returned to him, but apparently highly satisfied with the result of their hunt and fears were entertained that the negro had paid for his attempted crime with his life.

These were attentive throughout and responded to his frequently well-turned and forcible points with rapturous applause. THE STORM YESTERDAY.

Six Persons Struck by Lightning in Spartanburg—Damage in Other Places.

Yesterday afternoon, about half-past 2 o'clock, in advance of a refreshing rain which visited the city, a high wind whirled swept through the streets, raising the dust in clouds, slamming windows doors and breaking glasses out of windows in several places. The hurricane seemed to be the advance courier of a more violent storm which it had preceded.

This impression was confirmed later in the afternoon when news reached the city over the wires of its devastations in other places.

In Spartanburg, S. C. the storm was particularly severe, being accompanied with vivid flashes of lightning, one of which struck a dwelling in which five people, two of whom, a Mrs. Revan and daughter, were killed instantly, and the other three severely injured. Mr. Revan, who bore the relation of husband and father of the two who were killed, was in another portion of the town and was also injured by the lightning.

At Johnston's, a station on the Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta Railroad, two box cars were blown from the track.

At Chester several houses were unroofed and a new building, just erected by Mr. F. W. Ahrens, of this city, for a gentleman in that town, was entirely destroyed. It is under repair.

At Morrow's turnout, houses were unroofed and chimneys and trees were blown down.

The storm seems to have been very general and to have prevailed over a wide extent of territory. The damage cannot be estimated until the reports are in fuller.
