Mr. Treadaway at once hurried to the spot and found the men quarreling, Coker with his knife drawn, Mulis with a stick in his hand and the woman between them. Treadaway took the stick from Mullis and succeeded in stopping the fight for the time being. Coker then started on home remarking to Mullis that he would see him again and settle matter, when Mullis replied that then was as good a time as any to settle it. Whereupon Coker rushed upon Mullis and began striking him—with his open knife, as it was afterwards ascertained. In a more of those nuggets.


