The Confederate Bond Boom-Probabilities of Correspondence Between this Government and Great Britain

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.-Large purchases of Confederate bonds are now being made by leading brokers to fill orders of English customers. The price paid to-day, on an average, is about \$2 for each \$1,000 of bonds. Most of the securities bought here come from Virginia, North Carolina and Maryland, and it is a noticeable fact that holders are quite as ready to sell as brokers are to buy. There is little doubt that this purchasing movement grows out of the deposits made by officers of the Confederate States during the late war of \$8,000,000 in the Bank of England, and possibly that this sum, which still lies there unclaimed, may be divided pro rata among the holders of Confederate securities. It is not improbable that the question of the disposition of this money may become a subject of diplomatic correspondence between the governments of this country and Great Britain.


