Old Probs Reliability. The report of the chief signal officer of the United State's signal service bureau for the month of August, states that the detailed comparison of the tridaily indications for August, with the telegraphic reports for the succeeding twenty-four hours, shows the general percentage of verifications to be 88.8 per cent. The percentage for the four elements are: Weather, 88.4; wind, 85.4; temperature, 91.4; barometer, 90.1 per cent. The South Atlantic verifications are 91.3 per cent. Of the 3,721 predictions that have been make, 100, or 2.68 per cent., are considered to have entirely failed; 71, or 1.91 per cent., were one-fourth verified; 414, or 11.13 per cent., were one-half verified; 229, or 6.15 per cent., were three-fourths verified; 2,907, or 78.13 per cent., were fully verified, so far as can be ascertained from the tri-daily reports.


