Formula for Home-Made Fertilizer J. R. Thigpen in Tarbon Eoutherner.

As farmers from various sections of the State are constantly writing to me inquring the cost of the chemicals I used in the formula for home-made fertilizer, which I published in 1878, I will say I used

40 pounds sul. ammonia 5½c. - - \$2.20 40 pounds nitrate of soda 5c. - - 2.00 200 pounds ground bone - - - 4.00 To this added stable, sheep and goat

to make a long ton. When stable manure, etc., is not to be had then use cot- River it is not so bad. ton seed. This preparation I found to soils well drained. For the past three years I have

changed my formula and think it far preferable to the above.

Take all your stable manure and mix it with just a sufficiency of rich earth to beep it from burning. Then take 200 pounds of kainit, - - - - \$130

100 pounds of ground bone, - 2 00 and mix with two hundred pounds or as much as you may choose of the stable manure and you will have the cheapest preparation I have ever used on cotton. In fact it is by far the best preventive for all soils liable to black rust I know of. If you are short of stable manure kill your cotton seed and mix kainit at

the rate of two hundred pounds with twenty bushels cotton seed, and this is cheaper than any commercial fertilizer you can purchase for cotton, corn and

How a Young North Carolinian was Robbed in Norfolk.

On Wednesday evening last Mr. Mat-thew White, who hails from Hertford, N. C., took dinner at the Mansion House, and there made the acquaintance of a pseudo Philadelphia drummer of engaging manners. The parties went up to a house on Church street between Cove and Holt, where the North Carolinian was stopping. Shortly after an elderly man, who afterwards turned out to be an accomplice of the supposed drummer, came in with a long story about having made a fortune out West and coming here to help his brother out of difficulties, and that he had come to the room where they were, thinking it was a real estate office, as he wanted to buy a farm for his brother. The elderly stranger then did a little three-card-monte business, and Mr. White in-cautiously showed a roll of bills amounting to \$670. The strangers grabbed it, and a man who professed to be the proprietor of the house appeared on the scene and intimidated Mr. White by a threat of having him arrested for gambling. Mr. White left the house, but returned shortly, by which time, however, the rascals had decamped. It was thought they had escaped to Baltimore, but telegraphic communication with but telegraphic communication with that city failed to develop their where-abouts. Inquiry has also been made by wire of the authorities in certain localities in North Carolina, where it is thought the men were likely to have gone. Their names are known here, and they are known to be notorious in the head just above the eye, which sharpers from the North.

Jim Anderson Dead-A Queer Case.

Wilmington Star, 11th. James Anderson, to whom reference has several times been made in the Star in connection with his avowed determination to take no food, died at the county poor house yesterday afternoon, about 2 o'clock. JUSTIFIABLE HOMICIDE.

The Shooting of the Desperate Negro Waldrop by Dr. Thempson-He is 8hot Five Times Before he is Killed-Verdict of the Coroner's

Yesterday an inquest was held by Coroner Richardson over the body of Bill Waldrop, colored, who was shot by Dr. Sanford Thompson Thursday even-Dr. Sanford Thompson Thursday evening. An account of the shooting, as full as could then be gathered, appeared in this paper yesterday.

At the inquest yesterday the following facts were ascertained:

Dr. Thompson was passing by the store of Loftin Harrisson, in a buggy. Waldrop, who was a tall mulatto, well known to Dr Thompson, who had often befriended him, asked to be allowed to ride to his home. He was permitted to do so. When Waldrop's house was reached, Dr. Thompson stopped and prescribed for one of his children. As he was about to leave, Waldrop said. "I want to go over to Louis Davis's, if you

will let me ride with you. Dr. Thompson said "all right," and they drove off. When they reached a rocky knoll in the road, Waldrop push-ed and shoved Dr. Thompson in the side violently, saying:

"Don't push me out of the buggy." He then went on to say, "I am going over to give Louis Davis a genteel cursing; he is a d-n rascal." Dr. Thompson in reply, said, "I would

not do so if I were you; it will get you into trouble and cost you too muci Waldrop said, "Stop; let me get ont." Dr. Thompson then "cut" his biggy so Waldrop could get out.

No sooner did he touch the ground

than he cried out, "God d-n you, I am going to kill you," and seizing a large large flint rock, he hurled it at his head. Dr. Thompson dodged the rock, and when Waldrop was in the act of throwing another, he shot him. When Waldrop again attempted to throw it he

shot him again, striking him on the Waldrop then rushed to the buggy, intending to grapple with Dr. Thompson, who, at this juncture shot him twice in the breast. This not stopping him, and while Waldrop had his hands at his throat, Dr. Thompson shot him

wound killed him. Dr. Thompson went immediately to a magistrate and gave himself up.

A trial was had before Justices Lynam and Ray, and they discharged him upon the ground that he acted in selfdefense and was justified in what he did. Dr. Thompson has been a cripple for life. Wm. Waldrop was said by all who knew him to be a bad, desperate

The verdict of the coroner's jury was in accordance with the facts; that the homicide was justifiable.

The North Carolina Car Company. Raleigh News and Observer. Waters, of Philadelphia; was subscribed for, and the stockholders resolved to increase the capital stock \$20,000. We learn that a large portion of this increase has already been subscribed here. The works will be on the line of the Raleigh and Gaston Railroad, near their shops. The enterprise meets with the warmest favor, and in the hands of its energetic managers is already an assured success. In the works employment will be given to about seventy-five hands. It is the intention to equip the works with the latest improved fast-running machines.

A Kerosene Fire.

BRADFORD, PA., Feb. 12.-Last evening sparks from a locomotive set fire to little pools of oil in the low ground near Oleon, N. Y., where the pipe lines have a number of large tanks located. The fire communicated to three tanks containing 105,000 barrels of oil. The pipe line men from all sections were summoned to the scene. A large force started from here by the fast train with picks, shovels, common and chemical fire extinguishers.


