

Two Hundred More Square Miles Swept by the Flood.

NEW ORLEANS, March 29 .- A Times-The Key and Trinity sugar plantations also went under from back water. Sunday night Pine Tree levee, on the Mound plantation gave way and the Wednesday following the Marengo back leves was proken in five places. Other breaks are reported and the loss of crops alone will exceed half a million dollars. Two hundred square miles of land, occupied by 4,000 people, are covered with water, only three plantations, Mound, Shady Grove and Augusta par-tially escaping.

THE PLANTING OUTLOOK.

Smaller Area in Cotton, and Larger Crops of Oats and Corn.

given this matter more than usual importance, the facts detailed possess considerable interest, although the period is rather early to positively indicate a certain course of events. It bears out the previous reports in reference to an increased acreage and more attention to food products, which is now of leading value throughout the South. In relation to cotton the reports from

South Carolina say that much of the weather since January 16th was rainy and unfavorable, which is the tenor of thirty-two replies from twenty-nine counties, while fourteen replies represent the weather as fair and not unfavorable. Twenty-three correspondents report

the outlook in acreage as favorable as at the same time last year, and twenty-six anticipate a decrease of ten to twenty per cent. The replies show that more corn will be planted, the increase varying from ten to twenty per cent., and that an in-

creased acreage has been given to There is a general disposition to restrict the use of commercial fertilizers; thirty-three correspondents, mentioned that less fertilizers would be used, while their home, and have here children, fourteen say that the amount will probplanting of oats is generally stated to

be very large. The information from Georgia is very much the same as the above report from South Carolina, and these conditions apply to nearly all the southeast Atlantic States. The larger area devoted to the planting of the food staples and the imperative demand that an ample supply of provisions should be secured will for a time diminish the labor that will be given to the cotton crop, making a decrease of that crop in some sections almost certain. The season, however, has not yet sufficiently advanced to say what the result will be, and until the months of April and May have passed and the events during that time ascertained, an intelligent judgment can hardly be formed in reference to the area and prospects of cotton. In about four or six weeks the fate of the oat crop will be known, and the result of the corn planting may not be certainly ascertained until July.

The Western North Carolina Railroad. A Raleigh correspondent of the New ork Times, in announcing that the Western North Carolina Railroad is nearly finished, gives his views in rela-

tion to that work as follows: "The Richmond & Danville Terminal Railway company have at last completed the Western North Carolina Railroad to the Tennessee line. Within the next thirty days trains can pass from Morehead City, on the ocean, through the whole length of the State to the Mississippi river. There is less than one mile in Tennessee to be completed, which, although delayed by heavy rains, will be ironed by May 1st. There is a short link that is under contract to be completed by July next that will bring about through connection between Chicago and Cincinnati over the Knoxville and Ohio and the Kentucky Central Railroads to Painte Rock and on through North Carolina.

This then will be the shortest possible line between the cotton States east of the Blue Ridge and the Great West The chain of mountains extending from Lynchburg, Va., to Atlanta, Ga., a distance of 700 miles, cannot be crossed at any other points than down the French Broad river and through Paint

This makes the line of this great nighway nearly 200 miles shorter than any other possible line, and promises benefits to the State which in a few years may not be measured by seventy times the ten millions which the State spent upon it,

Wonderful development is already shown along the line of the road in the production of bright tobac o, for which Buncombe and Madison counties are noted, the opening of mines, the starting of enormous lumber enterprises by companies from Cincinnati and Chicago, and the immense increase in the value of the land, much of that on the line of the road having trebled in val-

Consequently a new order of things now exists in the Old North State. The same influences which have made the great West are beginning to show results here. The new activities of the day are impelling the people to measure alliquestions by their practical value to communities or to the State. The fact that the Richmond and Dan-

ville Terminal Railway company now owns a property that cost them less than one hundred thousand dollars, and upon which North Carolina spent in vain more than ten million, does not trouble the people at all in the light that this road, which has been on hand
