

Resolved, That the thanks of the Democratic party are due to Capt. Coke and his associates on the Central Committee for their services in the last campaign, and that as a testimonial of our high appreciation thereof the secretary be directed to cause the publication of this resolution.

The following extract from the plan of organization heretofore adopted is reprinted:

STATE CONVENTION. 1. The State Convention shall be com-

posed of delegates appointed by the several county conventions. Each county shall be entitled to elect one delegate for every three hundred Democratic votes, and one delegate for fractions over one hundred and fifty Demo-cratic votes cast therein at the last preceding gubernatorial election. In case any delegate shall fail to attend he may, by writing, signed by himself and attested by the chairman of his county executive committee, or the chairman of his county convention, appoint his own alternate; and none but delegates or alternates so appointed or provided shall be entitled to seats in said convention: Provided always, That such delegates as may be present at any Democast the whole vote to which their township or county may be entitled. 2. In all conventions thus provided for by this system, after a vote is cast, there shall be no change in such vote ntil the final result of the ballot shall

1.0 /411 The Drift of Manufacturing.

The time is not far distant when the phrase the manufacturing East" as distinguished from "the Agricultural West" will have lost its significance. Few people have any idea of the enormous strides the West has taken in manufacturing, or what proportion of the industries of any given State is manufacturing and what agricultural. The figures of the census of 1880 are not yet at hand to show accurately the relative importance of the various States in the two great industrial branches, yet the previous census, that of 1870, is sufficient for our purpose. From the table there enumerated it appears that Ohio's farm products were valued at \$190,256,000, while the manufactured products amounted to \$269,700,000. Indiana manufactured \$108,800,000 worth in 1870, and grew but \$123,000,000 worth of agricultural products. Illinois manufactured \$200,600,000 worth, and grew but \$210,800,000; Michigan's productions (other than agricultural) were \$118,300,000; agricultural, \$81,500,000; Wisconsin grew \$78,000,000 worth and manufactured \$77,000,000; Missouri in 1870 manufactured \$206,000,000, just twice the value of her agricultural products. Iowa manufactured \$46,500,000, and grew \$114,400,000. For purposes of comparison the States further West afford no figures for comparison as they have undergone such changes since

But these are sufficient to indicate the strength of manufacturing in what are known as the agricultural States of the West. During the last twelve years the strides of these States, both in agri-culture and in manufacturing, have been enormous. Already the making of furniture is a Western industry; the West grinds flour for the world. Kentucky has almost as many iron mills as Massachusetts, and Missouri has more. Illinois makes eight times as much and Wisconsin twice as much agricultural machinery as Massachusetts, and Ohio

makes more than New York. New York stove manufacturers are already feeling the competition of Western makers, and are begging the railroads to cheapen their freights West so they may not lose their trade, Waltham, in the East, and Elgin, in the West, no longer monopolize watch making, for St. Louis, in the Southwest, and Atlanta, in the South, premise to be formidable competitors. The States which are thus diversify ing their industries are enhancing their

importance, politically and industrially; manufacturing has saved the Western States from the "all wheat" or "all corn"




