They were told that the accused could not then be punished, and that if they did not agree upon a verdict, they would be kept in confinement until the end of

the term of the court, and that the case would probably be transferred to some Northern State! when they would be convicted instantly, whether guilty or not. Strom was ill and infirm, and is less to blame than his two compaions for surrendering. However, both Fountain and Strom appear to have had an idea that they could dissent from the verdict when the time came for its pre-sentation. This they did, and Steven-son sustained their statements by his affidavit. The verdict was recorded,

but it is a nullity.

II. The jury in the Mayesville case consisted of ten Republicans and two Democrats. The Democrats were M. F. Maloney, of Barnwell, the foreman of the jury, and Jesse Cannon, of Greenwille, Maloney Cannon, and white Review ville. Maloney, Cannon and white Republican named H. H. Jackson, from publican named H. H. Jackson, from Marion county, voted for a verdict of not guilty, but to Maloney the failure to convict was mainly due. Our information is that throughout the long week that the jury were kept together both Cannon and Jackson avowed their willingness to find the accused guilty, if Maloney would do so. The pressure upon him was tremendous, and he was threatened with bodily violence. Nothing but the reluctant conviction that Maloney would stay in the jury, even till doom's day, rather than allow innocent Carolinians to be sent to the penitentiary, caused the jury to be dis-

tentiary, caused the jury to be discharged. III. In the Bales case, for repeating, the jury consisted of ten Democrats and two Republicans. The Republicans were C. F. Holland, colored, and M. K. Robertson, white. The case was submitted to the jury without argument, the accused having proved incontestably that he was not at or near the place where he was said to have voted illegally. The government did not demand or expect a conviction, and a verdict of not guilty was premptly rendered.

IV. In the Barnwell conspiracy case the jury consisted of ten Democrats, and Holland and Robertson, as in the Bates case. This time the order to the

Republicans was to stand fast, and they did. The result was a mistrial, instead of the acquittal to which the accused were entitled. V. The jury in the Hope Engine-house case consisted of nine Republicans two Democrats and one Independent. The Democrats were Elias Mc-Tier, of Hampton, and Jesse Cannon,

of Greenville. J. H. Pepper, of Charleston, was the Independent. Cannon and McTier voted for the acquittal of the three accused officers. Collins, a Republican, joined them in voting to acquit Messrs. Maguire and Nixon, and the entire jury were satisfied of the innocence of Maguire and willing to vote to acquit him, if the conviction of the others could thereby be assured. But the Republicans would not agree to acquit a man whom they acknowledged to be innocent, unless they could score a conviction against somebody else! Pepper, the Independent, voted with the Republicans throughout

There was a mistrial. This is the brief record of what took place, as we can ascertain it. That there is no room to doubt, but the small number of cases which had sufficient substance to justify the district attorney in pressing them to a trial and the

character of the evidence in the trials are irrefragable proof that the reports of malpractices at the election were gross exaggerations.
