

OUR WASHINGTON LETTER. THE DEAD LOCK IN THE HOUSE.

A Review of the Contested Mackey-Dibble Case- The Democrats Willing to See a Fair, Honest Investigation, But not Partisan Counting in-- Who Mackey is-Personal Paragraphs and Postal Points.

WASHINGTON, May 28th, 1882.—On Monday, May 23rd, the dead lock in the Mackey-Dibble contested election case in the House of Representatives began; on Saturday, May 27th, the first week of the contest ended with the differences between the two great parties no nearer a solution than on the day of its commencement. When a great politi-cal party determines to filibuster to prevent the consummation of an object, that object should be of paramount importance, which, if accomplished, would work great harm either in fact or in principle. The great business interests of the country do not take much stock in purely political con-tests, and when public business is blocked by either party or both, the answer that party supremacy was at the bottom of the contest is not satisfactory. In this contest now pending in the House the question involved is one higher than party; it embraces princi-ples which if destroyed in a great measure sups the foundation of republics: for a government founded on pop-

ular voice can brook no taint of that original fountain and remain unshaken. In this case M. P. O'Connor received the governor's certificate of election from the Charleston, S. C., district, and had therefore a prima facia case. E. W. M. Mackey contested his seat on the ground of fraud and bull-dozing the usual grounds alleged by all contestants in the South. O'Connor died before he took his seat and the governor ordered an election to fill the vacancy. Mr. Samuel Dibble ran and was elected without opposition, the Republicans refusing to nominate anyone and declining to vote. Mr. Dibble, to all intents and purposes occupied and stood in the same position as Mr. O'Connor would had be been alive. He was admitted to his seat and Mackey transferred the contest from O'Connor. dead, to Dibble, living. The committee on elections pretended to investigate the matter and after several months reported in favor Mackey. Any quantity of testimony was submitted by both sides. Mr. Dib ble by counsel when the matter had assumed a bitter partisan aspect, moved to strike from the record the depositions in the case for the following rea-

1. That the contestant has wilfully, mony of the witnesses. 2. That the papers filed with the clerk of the House are not the genuine

depositions in the case. 3. That the depositions were not transmitted to the House according to law by the officers before whom they were 4. That many of the depositions were not attested by the witnesses as re-

quired by law. 5. That the so-called depositions were not reduced to writing in the presence of the officer before whom they purport to have been taken.

After quoting from the Revised Statutes in support of the reasons here stated and showing that forged testimony shall at least be investigated, Mr. H. E. Paine, Mr. Dibble's counsel in an elaborate brief before the committee, among other things said: Such a case has arisen and is now be-

fore this sub-committee. In the first place, the papers filed as contestant's depositions were not reduced to writing in the presence of the office. The affidavit of Mr. Hogarth, who, as notary public, took the contestant's depositions, shows that every word of all the e depositions, excepting three or four, was written out not merely in his presence but by his own hand. The affidavit of C. Smith shows that the depositions transmitted to the house were not the depositions so written out by the notary, but were papers written afterwards by Mr. Smith and other employes of the contestant, and by the contestant himself; that the depositions written out by the notary were partly burned up and partly torn up by the contestant, and that not a single page of the papers now on file with the committee as depositions of the contestant is in the handwriting of the notary, or was written in his presence, or ever read by him. The contestant has filed more than eighty affidavits, to which I shall refer again before I close. But in not one of these is there the faintest attempt at a denial of the fact which I have just stated. This fact stands absolutely proven and uncontradicted on the record of the case.

In the face of these facts the election committee resolved to seat Mackey and the Democrats in effect said "not until the alleged forged depositions are inquired into, and upon that question they have locked horns in the House, and upon that principle asserting the purity of elections, they are likely to be sustained by the people. They have done more; they have offered and kept the offer standing to proceed to any other business, to recommit the Bibble-Mackey case back to the committee to enquire into the alleged forgery; but no, the Republicans will not have it. In this case the rules of the House will allow the Democrats to filibuster until March 4th, 1883. All that is necessary is for the Democrats to laive sufficient numbers present to call the ayes and nays. Under the fead of Ex-Speaker Samuel J. Randall the Democrats will have the advantage of the best parliamentarian now in public life. It was he who in 1874 stood as a stone wall at the head of the Democratic minority of the House and prevented the passage of the infamous Force bill, which would have ground the South into dust, distroyed whatever liberty survived Appomattox and created in the South a hell on earth with the negroes as the little devils. All this was averted by that determined stand of the spartan Democracy. In the face of all this it seems strange indeed that in the South there should be men who will side with the Republicans who have never lest an opportunity to opportu days of reconstruction the South ever found a friend in the Northern Democracy, which has lived to battle for therights of the South until to-day she is a

minority of the party in the House of Representatives. But this is digressive. The Mackey case assumes another phase not generally known, and that is phase not generally known, and that is a moral one. He is as is well known a white man; his wife as is not generally known is a colored woman, and their children as may be surmised are mulattoes and attend colored schools in this district. This is the practical result of Republican teaching, and strange as it may appear there is much secret opposition to Mackey in the republican sition to Mackey in the republicamp since these things became kind. There have been colored men in gress, but they had colored wives, if Mackey should be had colored wives.

The other day he branched out into poetry and made some clever hits upon the names of his brother colleagues, especially Fulkerson, of Virginia, and Hewitt, of Alabama.

Since his return from Charlotte he has shaven off his full beard and now wears only a mustache and imperial. Thus disguised he attended the theatre the other night and was accused by a brother member of having thus dis-guised himself to escape recognition by the Sergeant-at-Arms who was in search of members to make a quorum in the House.


