



MODIFIED VIRUS.

How the Character of Certain Diseases is Changed by Inoculation. New York World, 6th inst.

The New Academy of Sciences held its last meeting prior to the summer adjournment at its hall, 12 West Thirty-first street, last night, and Dr. Wesley Miller read a paper upon "Prevention of Tubercular disease in men and animals by vaccination."

He said that he proposed to advance some new views upon the good results of the modification of the virus of contageous human diseases by its trans-mission from man to the lower animals and back again. In cases of simple inocculation of one human being with the disease from which another is suffering the poison is but slightly modified. Inocculation of animals with bovine virus of small-pox protects them against some other diseases. French scientists show that the degree of heat that destroys the bacteria destroys the infection.

The doctor claimed to have a method of curing human tuberculosis by inoculation with tuberculous virus that had been passed through healthy young cattle.

It is known that tuberculosis may be transmitted by contagion as well as in-occulation. The great need of a cure of phthisis is seen in the fact that one-quarter of the deaths in this city since 1804 were from this cause. Inasmuch as Jenner's vaccination has saved more lives than have been carried off by war since his time, it is strange that protection from various diseases by this method has not been pushed further.
There is strong evidence that pleuropneumonia in cattle is identical with human phthisis.

Scarlet fever has been traced to infected dairies. Diphtheria evidently comes sometimes from cake-bag in cows, and it is claimed that vaccination will cure it. Hydrophobia has been found to lose its fatal effects when transmitted through sheep to human beings. Cancer even will doubtless be found amenable to this preventive. Natives of the tropics inocculate themselves with the virus of a snake to protect themselves from snake bites.

Vaccination was evidently used long before Hypocrates and Jenner got the idea at second hand. Since Tyndall found bacteria in pure ice, it is hard to tell how they originate disease. It is useless to attempt to vaccinate with disease germs mitigated by oxygen as Villemaine proposed.

There is no reason why the system of vaccination should not be used to control and prevent all those diseases that now most thoroughly baffle physicians.
Ultimately this system would change the art of medicine from a curative to have been issued from the patent office preventitive system. President Newberry concurred in the

views of the essayist.

Mysteries of Population. The diminution of population in France, in spite of the paucity of her emigration, has inspired the idea of forming a table of the comparative growth of population in various countries; and according to the result, two at least of the Latin nations make a very poor showing. Whether there be law setting limits to the duration of a nation's procreative vitality is a question worth examining; for by such a natural law the decreasing vitality of certain nations might best be explained. The races which were nude and savage during the grandeur of the antique civilizations have become the most powerful and populous in our own time, and seem destined to maintain the lead;

while the descendants of the antique civilized nations are losing ground in many respects. And although high inintellectual development and cultivation may do much to increase comfort and secure longevity, it can do little toward preserving and protracting the individuality of a nation. It may be that certain nations are gradually passing out of existence, becoming weaker every decade, with the ultimate prospect of being absorbed by other nationalities. Numerical force as well as strong qualities of character, is essential to the preservation of national independence; for the rule of Thor still prevails in the world, and might will be right until the end of time.

Let us glance at the curious statistics given by a Paris paper. Russia has now some 90 millions of inhabitants; the United States 52 millions—for we stand second in numerical force among civilized people; Germany has 16 millions, Austro-Hungary, 38; France, 37; England 26 millions

land 36 millions. But it were erroneous to suppose that Angle-Saxon vitality is diminishing in any part of the world. What England apparently loses at home, she more than balances in her world of colonies. Her population is immense when we consider its increase in Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Cape Colony, and countless smaller colonial acquisitions. The ultimate amalgamation of Germany and Austria, which we have strong reason to believe in, would also elevate the population of German countries. tries to 84 millions or more. The Latin nations are even collectively small and weak in the face of these mighty Teutonic and Slavic confederations.

In the eighteenth century it was otherwise. Austria and Germany united had only 28,000,000, and Russia 25.000,000; while France had 26,000,000, England had only 12,000,000-how vast her growth in a hundred years-tripled even at home. According to this rate of increase supposing no war to occur in Europe during the interim—the fol-

lowing would be the population of the greatest civilized countries in 1932, after a lapse of 50 years: United States...... 190,000,900 Russia 158,000,000 German Empire...... 83,000,000 Great Britain 63,000,000 Austro-Hungary 51,000,000

France 44,000,000 habitants in the United States in the eighteenth century. But although the normal growth of population-varying slightly according to race-is known; there appear to be counter-laws in the universe checking nature's work more or less Malthus-wise. The spawn of one fish if fully matured would be enough to people oceans, the eggs of one ant enough to create a plague of insect life; but the laws of destruction allow comparatively few to survive. So also with human reproduction of species. Wars, famines, inundations, earthquakes, disintegration of social systems, pestilence, and innumerable other causes intervene to check the growth of population, and leave standing-room upon the world. There may be an unknown relation between growth of population and war—just as in the human economy there is a relation between growth and combaction. tween growth and combustion of certain tissues; and it is not unlikely that
