Charleston News and Courier.

The amount appropriated for the payment of special deputy marshals at Congressional elections for the year 1881 and prior years is \$112,600. Attorney-General Devens prepared a statement on the subject, showing the appointments for 1879. By this it is seen that the whole number of deputies appointed who served were 5,495. Of this number 5,001 were appointed under the provisions of the law relating exclusively to elections, and 493 were appointed in certain districts by virtue of the powers conferred upon marshals by Section 780 Revised Statutes, to appoint deputies with general powers to pre-serve order and keep the peace. Those appointed under the general authority of the marshals were not entitled to the \$5 per day provided under the election laws for special deputies. Alabama had 110 marshals, Arkansas 175, Florida 189, Illinois 215, Louisiana 241, Maryland 698, New York 2,210, Pennsylvania 792, South Carolina 46, Texas 79 and Virginia 95. In the Southern States hitherto, the Republican deputy marshals have been election runners, serving one political party and paid by the public. Their aim is to help the Republican candidates, and not to prevent fraud at elections when that fraud works in favor of their party.


