It is just making its initial trips, and though not so large as some sound steamers, I am certain no finer vessel plys on any line. The Guyandotte cost nearly half a million dollars. No hotel parlor in the country is more elegantly furnished. The state rooms are perfect. The dining room as handsome as King Solomon's was, and the bill of fare cannot be surpassed by even a Delmonico. The efficers of the steamer are a courteous, and most accommodating set of gentleman. There are 51 officers and crew The former being Capt. Kelly; Frederick Vincent, 1st officer; Wm. P. Mayer, purser; J. C. Booth, steward; Mr. Sundel, chief engineer. The Guyandotte can accommodate 150 passengers, first class, and carry enough freight (if all were food) to supply the whole city of Charlotte for weeks. No exaggeration I assure you. The boat is registered 2,350 tons burden; has three decks, one of iron, and is entered A 1 for 20 years,
