THE ORBIT OF PARTY ORGANI-

managers who believe in driving where they cannot lead:

Party government, properly under-stood, is a government of ideas; that is, a government whose course is guided and regulated by those ideas of policy which for the time being are accepted by the majority, but from which all corrupt influences and motives are eliminated. Parties are nevertheless liable to be assailed by the blindness of what is known as party spirit, which has always been deprecated by statesmen as a most serious and dangerous evil. But while warning us in the most solemn manner (as did the Father of his Country in his farewell address) against the dangers and abuses of party spirit and its tendency to intolerance, revenge and tyranny, ending in despotism as its natural result, it never occurred to the statesmen of the early days of the republic that the more insidious, debasing and corrupt uses to which parties have within recent years in barometer. been brought would be developed. The evils of which they spoke as likely to be evolved from the contests of party were not of the low and groveling sort. There was at least a manhood in the errors and passions against which they cautioned the people; a certain something which left the original nobler impress unobliterated, though tarnished. They did not anticipate that the provisions of the constitution relating to the appointment to office would have such a construction put upon them as would open a Pandora's box of evils. But so it is that first the unlimited power of removal from all offices except judicial offices was asserted, and then by degrees acted upon for considerations of party advantage, until finally the spoils system developed into hideous propor-tions. 
