THE FEVER ON THE RIO GRANDE.

GALVESTON, Sept. 15.—A News Matamoras special says there were 6 deaths in the last 24 hours by yellow fever. This is a sudden and startling increase. Two are soldiers and the rest are of the poorer classes. There is also a slight increase of cases and the disease is of a

more deadly character. A News Austin special says A C Ingarell, county judge of Starr county, to-day informed the Governor by wire of a large number of yellow fever cases at Mier, Mexico, resulting in 4 deaths yesterday. The merchants of Roma, Texas, refuse to quarantine on account of trade, and reports are also on hand Texas, refuse to quarantine on account of trade and reports are also on hand showing an outbreak of fever at Regnosa and Hidalgo, Mexico. The Governor has conveyed the information to Dr Swearingen, who at once telegraphed Surgeon General Hammond as follows: Yellow fever has appeared at Regnosa, Camargo and Mier, Mexico, opposite the coast of Hidalgo, and the towns of Rio Grande City and Roma to-day. Please establish a line of mounted guards connecting with the north ed guards connecting with the north end of your lower cordon and extending twenty miles above Roma. Roma is in danger of high water to the interior. If you cannot grant entire application give us guards to the front of Regnosa, Carmo, Camargo and Mier. We have no money to meet their heavy demands and trust again to ask for aid. Signed R W Swearingen, State Health

Congressman Moore Re-Nominated. MEMPHIS, Tenn., Sept. 15.—The republicans of the Tenth district have re-nominated W. R. Moore for Congress Evangelists in Red and Yellow Piping.

COTTON SEED OIL

To be Extracted by Means of an Ordinary Crusher and Benzine. The Planters' Journal, for September,

Suicides in France.

Some official statistics have just been issued in France of the suicides that have taken place in fifty years. They show that since 1830 the number of suicides has trebled. In 1830 there were five suicides for every 100,000 inhabitants; in 1850, ten; in 1860, eleven; in 1870, thirteen; in 1880, fifteen. The total of suicides in the last year reached 6,850, of whom 79 per cent, were men. The Seine Department stands at the head of the gloomy list, and Corsica has the smallest number of suicides—only two per 100,000 inhabitants. A painful fact is the growing frequency of suicides among children. Between 1876 and 1880 one hundred and ninesy-eight boys and forty girls below fifteen years boys and forty girls below fifteen years of age destroyed themselves. Of these, 209 were over twelve years of age, 21 were between the ages of twelve and ten, 4 were ten years old, and 6 were below nine, the youngest being only seven years old. It appears that by far the greatest number of suicides take place in the summer, the proportions per cent. being: Summer, 39; spring, 19; autumn, 24, and winter, 18.


