The Course of the Comet.

Cor. Baltimore Sun. WATHINGTON, Oct. 1.-Prof. Edgar Frisby, who is conducting the observations of the comet from the Naval Ob-servatory in this city, says the the impression of some observers that the comet struck the sun in its journey through the heavens is incorrect. He says from the observations made yes-

terday morning the nucleus appeared to be from 15 degrees to 20 degrees in the direction of the tail and about 3 or 4 seconds broad, and very bright. The tail appeared about 15 degrees long. It

terminates very abruptly, and is about 11/2 degrees in cross section. The outlines of the tail are sharp and well defined. It is observable between 4 and 5 a. m. in the eastern sky.

Prof. Frisby says the comet was nearest the sun Sept. 11. At that time it was not more than 300,000 or 400,000 miles from the sun's surface. It was then moving from the sun. On the 19th of September it was about 17,000,000 miles from the sun; on the 21st it was about 26,000,000 miles, and it is now about 60,000,000 distant from the sun. The Professor says its motion decreases as it gets further away from the snu. When observed yesterday morning it was moving in a southwesterly direction. Its position was about 10h. 42m. right ascension and 6 degrees 27 minutes south declination. He says it is now about 110,000,000 miles from the earth.

Prof. Frisby produced several illus-trations and calculations to prove that the comet has not yet come in contact with the sun. As shown by the figures above it is traveling away from thesun as fast as possible. He says, however, that it went very close to the sun. The Professor says when it was first observed Sept. 11 it was moving north of east, s now going south of west, thus




