ITEMS OF INTEREST.

From the old era of shinplasters and lepreciated paper money, we have passed to one of hard money. We have gone from one extreme to another with vim; for we now hald as a people \$715,800 000 of coin, of which \$512,000,000 is gold coin. Upon this coin and upon our other assets and general credit we do, it is true, float \$825,000,000 in paper money; but practically we are down to a hard money basis, and paper money is now used chiefly on the score of con-

Ex-Secretary Evarts is the patriarch of a charming family colony on his estate at Windsor, Vt. Four handsome dwellings now nestle among the green fields and maple groves of the picturesque valley, occupied by Mr. Evarts and his three married children, the newest of them having just been completed for his daughter Bessie, who was married last summer. The entire family is now preparing for a removal to New York for the winter.

Geological examination of the delta of the Mississippi now shows that for a distance of about three hundred miles there are buried forests of large trees, one over the other, with interspaces of sand. Ten distinct forest growths of this description have been observed, which, it is believed, must have succeeded each other. Of these trees, known as the bald cypress, some have been found over twenty-five feet in diameter, and one contained 7,500 rings; in some instances, too, huge trees have grown over the stumps of others equally large. From these facts, geologists have assumed the antiquity of each forest growth at 10,000 years, or 100,000 for all.

The Spanish government owns the Philipine Islands, where the cholera epidemic has shown a mortality that has never been exceeded even in the east. In one month on these islands alone more than 30,000 persons died of the scourge. The disease is very violent in Manila, the chief city of the colony. It has extended to Borneo and Sumatra, and to other portions of the Dutch East Indies. These districts are full of Mahomedans, some of whom annually visit Mecca, where they mix with the western pilgrims. This may carry the malady to the Mediterranean and of course to Europe; but the authorities are vigilant and modern saniof Europe altogether.

Of hot milk as a stimulant the Medical Record says; "Milk heated too much above 100 degrees Fahrenheit loses for a time a degree of its sweetness and density. No one who, fatigued by over-exertion of body or mind, has ever experienced the reviving influence of a tumbler of this beverage, heated as hot as it can be sipped, will willingly forego a resort to it because of its being rendered somewhat less acceptable to the palate. The promptness with which its cordial influence is felt is indeed surprising. Some portion of it seems to be digested and appropriated almost immediately, and many who now fancy they need alcoholic stimulants when exhausted by fatigue, will find in this ample draught an equivalent that will be abundantly satisfying and far more enduring in its effects."

Breaking Up "Marriage Associations." The postoffice authorities in Washngton have determined to wage unceasing warfare against the numerous marriage and birthday associations which are springing up all over the country, by closing the mails to all circulars, letters, &c., promulgated by them. Inspector A G Sharp, to whom the matter was referred, has reported, recommending that such associations be prohibited from using the mails, on the ground that they are frauds. The associations propose testing the ques-tion. They say marriage associations are just as legal as other insurance companies, and that when fraud is specifically proven in any case the association involved, and not all of them, should be discriminated against.

A Mournful Story.

A lady whose husband died a year or two ago, leaving her with six children, all under twelve years of age, and no property whatever, was so fortunate as to get a \$900 position in one of the departments in this city. On this salary she is trying hard to bring up her family respectably, for she is a woman of substantial worth and refined tastes, always accustomed to good society Last week this widowed mother received a peremptory demand for \$45, to be used in a State campaign. The demand came from an alleged statesman who is in high favor with the Administration. It was couched in terms that brooked no denial. The lady went to a broker, hired the money at five per cent. a month-which is but half the usual rate in such cases- and paid the \$45 over to the agent of the statesman who had demanded it. We have the names of the parties, and all the details of the business, but suppress names, in order that the lady may not be disturbed in her position. It is needless to add that the family must be deprived of a part of their winter outlit of clothing in order that the broker may be paid his \$45 and interest. If this were a sporadic case, it might not be worthy of editorial comment, but it is one of many cases.
