The Pope has sent an autograph letter and presents to Queen Victoria. The Lackawanna and Pittsburg railroad company, capital \$4,000,000, was incorporated at Albany Wednesday. The road is to run from the Genesee Valley Canal railroad, near Rockville, to the New York, Lackawanna and Western road at Perkinsville.

A week ago last Sunday Henry P. Cooper, a well known New York tailor, was taken to a. private functic asylum at Flushing. L. I., at the instance of two brothers. Proceedings have been begun by a third brother to have Mr. Cooper released from the asylum.

Postmaster-General Howe estimates the receipts and expenditures of the Postuffice Department for the next discal year, ending June 30, 1884, as fol lows: Receipts, \$50,670,456.27; expenditures, \$46,741,111.25; excess of receipts over expenditures, \$3,029,345.02.

An action has been brought by the Western Union Telegraph Company and Jay Gould against the Mutual Union Telegraph Company, to prevent such a disposition of the stock of the Mutual Union, as will deprive the Western Union of the influence in the management of the Mutual Union to which it claims to be entitled as the owner of a majority of the stock. Jay Grata swears that \$247,000 were paid for these securities.

Secretary Folger has received the report of the commission appointed to make a thorough examination as to the resent force employed in the customs service at the port of Boston. The collector's office - employs 352 persons, at an annual compensation of \$455,157 25 naval effice 10 persons, at \$33,900; surveyors office 47 persons, at \$68,820; making a total of 428 persons at an annual compensation of \$575,737 25. Utilizing Sun Rays. Mr. William Calver, a mining export living in Washington, has just patented a new discover, which promises large results. It is very ample, consisting of an arrangement by which the rays of the sun are reflected from any number of mirrors upon a common focus. By accident, Mr. Calver directed the light from two ordinary looking glasses upthe same surface, and he immediately observed that the resultant heat was about doubled. Continuing his experiments in this direction, he succeeded in reducing wood to ashes and metal to a liquid state merely by concentrating upon them the reflected rays of the sun from twenty small mirrors with flat surfaces. Mr. Calver does not pretend to explan the principle, he has simply pursued his experiments until he has brought the process to a point where it

can be patented. A reporter of the Washington Post has seen the model in the patent office, and has witnessed some of the experiments. The model patented by Mr. Calver consists of a number of small looking glasses, arranged in rows upon a frame so fixed that they can be converged upon any one point. A working model, of which he has a number, was exhibited to a reporter, in the yard in the rear of his residence. Forty innocent, guileless looking fifteen cent gilt framed mirrors, each 334 inches by 534 inches, were arranged upon a frame propped up like an artist's easel and bearing a striking resemblance thereto. Facing the east was the fragment of what was once a barn door, also propped up and partly covered with a worn and faded sheet of zinc that bore unmistakable evidence of having been burned through in several places. It was but the work of a minute to converge the forty mirrors upon a space 334 inches by 534 inches upon the barn door, and then the revelation began. As each mirror cast its quota of sunshine upon the common store the parallelogram of light grew whiter and more dazzling, until at last it looked like a patch of electric light. But little patience was required to await results. In less than thirty seconds a thin curlng puff of smoke gave evidence of the progress of the experiment. In a minte the board was bursting out in flames. The focus was then shifted upon the zinc. In a few minutes it began to turn color; then shrink, as if anxious to get away where it was cooler, and then in less than three minutes, the entire surface covered by the focus was literally

melting, drop by drop. To melt zinc requires a temperature of over 700 degrees Fahrenheit. The light projected upon the focus is wonderfully white and brilliant. Each mirror adds its quota not only of heat, but light, until the effect produced is more dazzling than that of the electric light. Mr. Calver has produced more than 400 degrees of heat with his mirrors and it is shown by calculation that one thousand mirrors, each a foot square, will melt iron and steel almost instantly. Even this heat can be con-densed and made to produce remarkable results. The mirrors will project more heat in winter than in summer, and they may be utilized for producing power cheaply by doing away with coal and wood. Indeed, the mirrors, if they will do all that Mr. Calver expects, may be regarded as the employment of a new force to minister to the necessities


