He showed us a ham, which though 12 months old, was as good and sound as though right fresh—no signs of bugs or worms about it. The plan for thus preserving hams is very simple and we preserving nams is very simple and we give it for the benefit of our readers as given us by Mr. Jones: After the pork is sufficiently salted wash the hams clean and sprinkle with fine black pepper some dry day in February, before the flies and bugs get on the meet wash the flies and bugs get on the meat, wrap the hams in two common newspapers, then put them in large strong paper sacks, such as fancy grocers put up flour in, fold the sacks close round the shank and double the end down and tie it tight with a strong string, hang them up until wanted for use, and they will be all right, with no bugs nor worms on them

Brookshaw, who threatened the Prince of Wales, has been sentenced to ten years' penal servitude. Rev. G. G. Sweeny, assistant priest at St. Paul's Catholic church, Philadelphia,

died Monday night. A very large sun spot was seen from the Harvard College observatory Tuesday, visible with the naked eye. In the opinion of observers this verifies the theory that magnetic and electrical disturbances and flashing northern lights are primarily caused by solar phe-

nomena. An agreement was arrived at Tuesday between the State auditor of Kentucky and a committee of the Kentucky Distillers' Association under which the distillers will act as the agents of the auditor for the collection of the tax on bonded whisky owned by non-residents, which the Supreme court of Kentucky has decided to be subject to State

and county taxation. A north-bound freight train on the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac Railroad was wrecked Tuesday, near Fredericksburg, Va., by running on a section of track from which the repair hands had removed the rails. James Young, the engineer, stuck to his post and was killed by the over-turning of his engine. He was the oldest engineer on the road. The fireman escaped by jumping.

On account of the prevalence of diphtheria and other contagious diseases in Boston the board of health has forbidden public funerals where persons die of contagious diseases. The health officer of Philadelphia reports that during the year 1882 there were 730 deaths from diphtheria, and that it is now largely on the increase.

The congressional committee to in-

vestigate the cause of the decline in American shipping held its concluding session in New York. Lieut Kelly, of the United States navy, gave it as his opinion that two-thirds of the shipwrecks are due to ignorance and incompetency. Senator Conger and Representatives Cox and Dingley were appointed a sub-committee to draft a bill and a report to be presented to Congress at the next session.


