

Dr. York's bill on the internal revenue differs from those of his colleagues. He proposes to appropriate the surplus in the Treasury and all money hereafter to be derived from internal revenue taxation for the purposes of education.

The new librarian of the House of Representatives is Col. William Butler, of South Carolina, a brother of Gen. M. C. Butler, Senator from South Carolina, and brother-in-law of Gen. M. W. Ransom, Senator from North

Carolina. He was first an officer of the old United States army, and then a colonel in the Confederate army. The appointment was made after the efforts of the North Carolina delegation had failed to secure the place for that State, which has held it under Democratic rule for many years. The value of the place is \$2,000 per annum.

The reason people's eyes require magnifying glasses is explained in this way: Just back of the pupil is a bit of elastic jelly, shaped just like a lens, held in place by a circular muscle and a flexible ligament. When distant objects are sighted the muscles relaxes, the ligament stretches and flattens the lens: and when the object to be seen is near, the muscle contracts and the lens resumes a globular shapes. In old age the elastic lens gets stiff, and does not spring back into a globular form. Magnifying lenses have to be added in order to get the image of near objects focused on the retina. 


