Phifer vs. Railroad.

1. A stipulation in a bill of lading given by one of an associated through line of common carriers, to the effect that if damage to the goods should be sustained by the shipper, only the company in whose custody the goods were at the time of loss shall be answerable, is a reasonable one and consistent with public policy; and the shipper who accepts it is bound by its terms and conditions, whether he reads it or not.

2. Quere, as to the extent of liability of common carriers by sea, and now far the same has been modified by act of Congress which exempts the owner of a vessel from responsi unless caused by the negligence of such owner.

3. The stipulation for exemption from responsibility must be just and reasonable in the eye of the law, and hence it is not lawful for a common carrier to so stipulate for negligence of itself or its agents. 4. The facts of this case do not






