MORNING'S NEWS

The British bark Captain is ashore near Antwerp. The ship Northumbria, from Liverpool, for Mobile, was damaged by a collision and had to put into Holland.

Mr. John C. New has tendered his resignation as Assistant Secretary of the U. S. Treasury. There is no change in the Senatorial situation in Kentucky.

W. A. Funderburg's sons offer \$200 reward for the arrest of William Gregory, by whom Mr. Funderburg was slain.

The address of the respective candidates for the U. S. Senatorship in Kentucky seem to have considerable stick in them, and the latest indications are that there is no prospect for an early break of the deadlock.

Before the conclusion of Ray's speech the committee rose, on account of the star route frauds and requesting the names of the persons indebted to the government and of the witnesses.
