Meeting of the Democratic National Committee, &c. CHICAGO, July 7.—The Democratic National Committee began its session at noon today, Chairman Barnum presiding.

On motion of Bayard a vote of thanks was given to Edmunds for the ability, courtesy and impartiality with which he had performed the duties of President pro tem of the Senate.

The chair announced his appointment of Allison, Hale and Pendleton as members of the part of the Senate of a commission provided in the civil service bill to consider the present organization of the signal service, geological survey, &c.

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THE LAST DAY. END OF THE FIRST SESSION OF THE 48TH CONGRESS.

After Transacting Some Business of Minor Importance What was Left of Both Houses of Congress, Generally Adjourned and Retire to Chicago or their Constituents.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—SENATE.—The Senate met at 10 a. m. A message was received from the House of Representatives announcing non-concurrence in the Senate amendment to the bill making temporary provision for naval service.

Hale moved that the Senate recede from its amendment. The Senate receded from its amendment.

On motion of Sherman a committee of two Senators was appointed as the joint committee to inform the President of the United States that Congress having finished its business was now ready to adjourn.

The chair appointed Sherman and Bayard. Brown asked if the chairman of the appropriation committee could state aggregate amount of the appropriations this year.

Allison replied in the affirmative stating that the amount was \$193,301,087.013. Allison added that in respect to one or two features of the naval bill this amount was estimated.

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taken the chair, Cox, of New York, offered a resolution tendering the thanks of the House to J. C. S. Blackburn for his just, remarkable and charming manner displayed in the closing hours of this session as Speaker pro tem.

On motion of Vance, of North Carolina, a bill was passed removing the political disabilities of John Randolph Hamilton, of North Carolina.

Cassidy, of Nevada, moved to suspend the rules and pass the Senate bill appropriating \$100,000 for the erection of a public building at Carson City, Nevada.

On this question no quorum voted and tellers were ordered. They remained in their places for nearly an hour without any definite result.

Consent was given now and then to the passage of measures relative to the pay of House employees.

Cassidy, who was one of the tellers on the public building bill, declined to report the result of the vote in order that he may have the floor in December next.

As far as the vote was taken it stood 49 to 1. Thus, amid much noise and confusion, but no business, the 48th Congress died away a few moments before the hour of 2 o'clock.

The hands of the clock were turned five minutes, ordered to permit of the reception of a message from the Senate announcing the adoption of the resolution postponing the hour of adjournment until three o'clock.

On motion of Woodford, of Kentucky, a bill was passed increasing the pension of soldiers who have lost an arm at the shoulder joint to the amount received by those who have lost a leg at the hip joint.

At 2:15 the recreation of a call of the House was indulged in. The doors were closed and excuses were made for absentees, the favorite excuse offered being that the gentlemen were in Chicago.
