The Charlotte Observer A SUCCESSFUL MAN.

Brief Sketch of Er. J. S. Carr, Whom Durham is Indebted for Much of Her Prosperity.

The Planter's Journal, published at Vicksburg, Miss., in an article on the industries and prominent business men of North Carolina, furnishes the following sketch of Mr. Julian S. Carr, President of Blackwell's Durham Tobacco Company:

Mr. Julian S. Carr furnishes the most striking exemplification of the kind of blood that is to redeeming, regenerating and disenthralling the South. This and the further fact that the writer was the recipient of many courtesies during his recent visit to North Carolina, at the hands of the last named gentleman, warrant all that will be said about him in the course of this article, which owes its origin rather to impulse than any preconceived intantion.

Mr. Carr's success, while in one sense almost phenomenal, is yet in no wise a departure from the fixed laws of cause and effect, and therefore by no means beyond the reach of others who may desire to profit by

While yet a boy he entered the army, and came out as he went in, "a high private in the rear rank," as he expressed it when in the company of a party of Colonels and Majors. He obtained a fair education at the University of North Carolina, and soon after the war, like so many other misguided young men in the older States, he was induced to believe that the West was the place to make his fortune. And so he went off to Arkansas—to Little Rock, which was perhaps the best place he could have selected. There he had that measure of success which most industrious, sober, intelligent young men meet with wherever they go, and in all probability he might by this time have been one of the leading men of the Arkansas capital had he remained there. But it happened that during a visit to his native State his relatives persuaded him to settle closer to home. At that time (1870) Mesers. Blackwell & Green were doing a very sale, snug little tobacco manufacturing business at Durham, and were looking about for a partner with a view to enlarging it. For a few thousand dollars young

Carr bought a third interest with
them, and this was the beginning of
his career as a tobacco manufacturer.

From the very day of his entrance
into the firm, the foundation for
what is now five times the largest into the firm, the foundation for what is now five times the largest smoking tobacco factory in the world, commenced being laid. Not with stone and mortar, for they staid in their little wood factory several years longer, but in head work and hand work. A policy was at once mapped out that needed only faithful, consistent execution to bring about the success that has finally been reached.

Mr. Carr soon demonstrated his ability not only to design but to perform.

His first and foremost principle in business was to give to the public a genuine article, one that would come to stay, and the second was to let the world know that the product of W.

T. Blackwell & Co's. factory was the purest that grew in the fields of the "Golden Belt."

For seven years the bulk of the firm's profits were spent in advertising. Of course that advertising would have proven futile in the end had it misrepresented the article; but neither pains nor expense were spared in giving the public all that it had been led to expect. And in this connection, Mr. Carr's statement that from his experience newspaper adconnection, Mr. Carr's statement that from his experience newspaper advertisements pay better than any other, will be appreciated by us who live by "the art preservative of all arts." And another significant fact of interest to one craft is that such a man as Mr. Carr declares it to be his rule to increase his expenditures on account of advertising in proportion to the increase of his sales.

Had it not been for the enterprise

Had it not been for the enterprise displayed by such leaders in the tobacco manufacturing industry as Mr. Carr and his associates, it is more than likely that the unnatural state of affairs that has so long characterized cotton manufacture would have

ized cotton manufacture would have had, in great measure, its counterpart in tobacco; that is to say, the bulk of it would probably have been manufactured at the North. Indeed, we can all remember how for a long time after the war this was actually the case; but, thanks to the pluck and enterprise of a few men, the manufacture of tobacco is chiefly done just where that of cotton should be and soon will be done, in the midst of the very fields in which it grows. Although at the head of such an Although at the head of such an immense establishment, this typical North Carolinian, whom we are having so much to say about, is not yet thirty-nine years old! And, as has been stated, his connection with the

enterprise that has made him rich, and we were about to say famous, began only fourteen years ago, when he had no special advantage either in means, education or business experience, over thousands of his contemporaries. Some may say he has been very lucky. Well perhaps he has; but you or I, my good friend, have only to adopt Julian S. Carr's ways of work pursuant to a fixed line of rinciple, in order to have the same

kind of luck that he has had. Per-haps not quite so much of it, but still enough to satisfy every healthy aspi-Is he married? you ask. Oh yes; no man succeeds as he has succeeded without being married. In the myswithout being married. In the mysterious economy of nature it is ordained that men who live alone get have into them that some how or other interfere with that even balance which is so absolutely indispensable to well directed effort. Not only is he married, but to use his own words, he took a piece of advice that was given him by Governor Conway, one of his Arkansas friends, who told him to "marry a girl that was used to the range." This was Miss Annie Graham Parrish, of the town of Durham.

Mr. Carr is very proud of North Carolina's progress, and takes a great deal of pleasure in talking about it to strangers. He never fails, either, io give credit to whom credit is due.

The increased prosperity of the Southern universities is one of the encouraging signs of the times. The total number of students last session at the University of Mississippi, at Oxford, was about 300, being an increase of 50 over the previous session.
The faculty consists of 19 capable professors, and the State gives a professors, and the State gives a handsome annual appropriation.

Moreover, the State supports its Agricultural College at Starkville, its Alcorn University (colored) at Oakland, and contributes extra \$3,000 to the Tongaloo College, (colored) and \$3,000 to the State Normol School at Holly Springs. Tuition is free at Oxford (except law school) and at Starkville and Oakland. In all, Mississippingives free instruction in the three pi gives free instruction in her three pi gives free instruction in her three universities to six hundred of her youth. The register of Vanderbilt University, at Nashville, Tenn., shows that this distinctively Southern institution has fifty-five instructors and two vacant chairs. It has six departments, each with its own faculty, and confers twelve degrees, which are not honorary, but only given to those students who fulfill the requirements. The number of students is four hundred and fifty-nine, representing every Southern and some of the North and Western States.


