GOVERNOR CLEVELAND'S REPLY. Governor Cleveland, who had stood meanwhile as an intent listener, replied as follows:

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen of

the Committee: Your formal announcement does not, of course, convey to me the first information of the result of the convention lately held by the Democrats of the Nation, and yet when, as I listen to your message, I see about me the representatives from all parts of the land of the great party which, claiming to be the party of the people, asks them to trust it with the administration of their government, and when I consider, under the stern reality which the present surroundings creates, that I have been chosen to represent

that I have been chosen to represent the plans, purposes and policy of the Democratic party, I am profoundly impressed by the solemnity of the occasion, and by the responsibility of my position. Though I gratefully appreciate it, I do not, at this moment, congratulate myself upon the distinguished honor which has been conferred upon me, because my mind is full of the anxious desire to perform well the part which has been assigned to me; nor do I at this moment, forget that the rights and interests of more than fifty millions of my fellow citizens are involved in our efforts to gain Democratic supremacy. This reflection presents to my mind the consideration which more than all others gives to the more than all others gives to the aspect. The party and its represen-tatives which ask to be entrusted, at the hands of the people, with the keeping of all that concerns their

welfare and their safety, should only ask it with a full appreciation of the sacredness of the trust, and with the firm resolve to administer it faithfully and well. I am a Democrat because I believe this truth lies at the foundation of true Democracy. I have kept the faith because I believe, if rightly and fairly administered and applied, Democratic doctrines and measures will insure the happiand measures will insure the happiness, contentment and prosperity of the people. If in the contest upon which we now enter, we steadfastly hold to the underlying principles of our party creed, and at all times keep in view the people's good, we shall be strong, because we are true to ourselves and because the plain and independent voters of the land will seek, by their suffrages, to compass urge to continuous or esrnest labor and effective party organization. Let us not fail in this, and we may confidently hope to reap the full reward of patriotic services well performed. I have thus called to mind some simple truths and trite thought. It seems to me, we do well to dwell upon them at times. I shall soon, I hope, signify in the usual formal manner my acceptance of the nomination which has been tendered
