CHOLERA'S PROGRESS. What is it doing in France and elsewhere. MARSEILLES, August 18.—There were 4 deaths from cholera here last night. At Toulon there was 1 death in the hospital and several in town.

ROME, August 18.—At Bergamo three fresh cases of cholera have been reported. At Compiasno 5 fresh cases and 4 deaths at Cosenza 2 fresh cases.

TOULON, August 18.—Six deaths from cholera occurred here today between the hours of 10 a. m. and 6 p. m. The number of serious cases is increasing.

Civil Service Examinations. WASHINGTON, August 18.—Judge Thoman, of the Civil Service Commission, says that owing to the large number of applicants for positions in the Department it will be necessary to hold examinations in the Southern States and some of the Northern States as soon as possible.

Death of one of Garfield's Surgeons. WASHINGTON, August 18.—Col. J. Woodward, Surgeon U. S. A., died this morning near Philadelphia. Surgeon Woodward was one of the physicians in attendance on the late President Garfield. He had been in bad health for a long time.

A Torrid Wave in New Hampshire. DORSET, N. H., Aug. 18.—The torrid wave today has caused a general suspension of all outdoor work. The mercury reached 100 at 11 o'clock. Several persons were prostrated by heat.
