THE VIRGINIA LEGISLATURE.

A FLAG DISPUTE.

A Difference of Opinion Between the Austrian Consul and the Pittsburg Chief of Police.

PITTSBURG, PENN., Aug. 18. - Max Schamberg, the Austro-Hungarian consul in this city this morning hoisted a small Austrian flag over the door of his consulate in honor of the 54th birthday of the Emperor of Austria. The Chief of Police Brown, who has been making a vigorous fight against siwinging signs and street obstructions, immediately ordered it down. Schamberg refused to comply with the order and Brown entered suit to compel its enforcement. Schamberg claims that the order is a direct violation of the treaty between the United States and Austria, which states explicitly that consuls can hoist their flag over the main en-trance of their consulate in any city.




