THEY WILL LIE.

Not satisfied with lying broadcasts during the campaign the Radical papers still keep it up. Within the past week they have varied the programme by dropping the South long enough to manufacture and regale their readers with a sensation at story about an ill feeling that has sprung up between Messrs Cleveland and Hendricks culminating in a positive break during the visit of the latter to the former after his visit to Brooklyn.
