HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

After a Skirmish on Public Buildings, The House Passes the Naval Appropriation, and Takes up the Diplomatic and Consular Appropiation Bill. Washington, D. C., January 10.

—House —Immediately after the reading of the journal Randall moved

to dispense with the morning hour for the purpose of pressing the naval appropriation bill to a passage.

This was strongly opposed by Stockslager, who maintained that the House should proceed to the consideration of the special order in ref-erence to public buildings.

Randall pointed out the importance

of passing the appropriation bills speedily. Not to do so would be to risk an extra session, which would be of little good to the country and still less to the party to which he belong-

Stockslager replied with some warmth that he was performing what he considered his duty in contending for the execution of the special order. Quite a brisk and apparently per-sonal colloquy then sprang up be-tween Randall and Stockslager, but the confusion in the hall was so great as to render their remarks unintelligi-

Stockslager demanded the year and nays on Randall's motion which was lost, yeas 135, nays 83, the necessary two thirds not voting in the

Stockslager moved that the House go into committee of the whole for the consideration of the public build-ing measures, and he asked consent to make a statement.

Hutchins, of New York, objected. The navy department was without appropriations, and it was time the House should proceed to business. Stockslager's motion was lost, 82 to 91, and the Speaker proceeded to call the committees for reports. Several public building bills were reported, and referred to the committee of the whole. Among them is one appropriating \$5,000 for a public building at Fortress Monroe. The House then went into committee of the whole, (Mr. Welburn, of Texas, in the chair, on the naval appropriation bill for the remainder of the current year. The following is the report of the com-

mittee on appropriations in explana-nation of the bill: "The bill makes provision for the naval service for the 6 months ending June 30th, 1885, on the basis of the bill which passed the House during the first session of this Congress giving for each item of expenditure just one half of the amount contained in said bill, with the following exception: For current expenses bureau of yards and docks, in lieu of one half or \$100,000, there is given \$90,000; for necessary repairs under the bureau of medicine and surgery, in lieu of one half or \$5,000, there is given \$2,500; for current ex-

already shown in stimulating enter- penses of bureau of construction and prises that will lead to still greater repairs, in lieu of one half or \$500,000, there is given-\$450,000; for current expenses, bureau of steam engineer ing, in lieu of one half or \$375,000, there is given \$280,000, together with the unexpended balance of \$140,000 from the appropriation in 1884 for the monitors; for the pay of the navy and marine corps there is given in lieu of one half, the amount con-tained in said bill a sum equal to the

There is nothing in the bill for the steel cruisers, appropriations to complete them having already been made. The bill appropriates in all \$6,120,155, which added to the sum appropriated for the first six months, which ended December 31st, 1884, \$8,860,317.11, makes the total appropriations for the navy for the entire fiscal year of 1885, \$14,980.472. 59, or \$913,961 less than was appro-priated for the fiscal year of 1884. A STABBING AFFRAY. Capt. Phelan Lured from Kansas City

to New York and Attacked by an As-New York, Jan. 10.—Yesterday an effort was made in the office of O'Donovan Rossa to assassinate Cap tain Thomas Phelan, of Kansas City, who was suspected of betraying the secrets of the dynamiters, from an interview with him published in the

Kansas City Times. He received a letter from one Kearney in New York, asking him to come to that city, in response to which letter he went away on the 8th. The day af-ter he went to O'Donovan Rossa's office, where he was met in a friendly way by Kearney, there were present two other men whom he did not know. Shortly after another man came in with a knife in his hand, walked directly up to Capt. Phelan who was sitting on a chair, and began slashing savagely at him with the knife, cutting him in several places, and nearly severing the right arm. Phelan effected his escape into the street where he fell upon the sidewalk and was picked up by the police, His assailant ran after following him to the door, cutting as he ollowed, and was seen crossing City Hall place, where he was arrested, blood being found on his pants and clothes. He accounted for the blood by saying that he was a butcher.
