SOMERSET, PA., May 15. - About 6:30 p.m. the town of Somerset was shaken from centre to circumference by an explosion of nitro-glycering and dynamite at the Somerset chemical works, located one mile east of ical works, located one mile east of town, on the farm of John Lane. The explosion occurred in the nitroglycerine agitating house, where one of the proprietors, W. L. Beach, of New York city was at work. He was blown into atoms. The largest piece of bone, flesh or clothes that could be found was not larger than a could be found was not larger than a silver dollar. The nitro-glycerine building and eight other buildings were strewn to the winds, portions of them being found miles away. The works are situated in an opening in dense word. works are situated in an opening in a dense wood, the large trees of which were uprooted and blown down for rods around by the force of the dense wood, the large trees of which were unrooted and blown down for rods around by the force of the explosion. From 12 to 15 men are employed at the works, but owing to its being Ascension day, none of them were at work. Where the building in which the explosion occurred atood there is a hole large enough to bury the building in. There was 800 pounds of nitro glycerine and 3,000 pounds of nitro glycerine and 3,000 pounds of dynamite in the different pounds of intro giverine and 3,000 pounds of dynamite in the different buildings. The loss is very heavy. An explosion occurred at the same place about the middle of January, when two men were killed.
