LUNATIC SHOOTS A WOMAN AND BLOWS HIS OWN BRAINS OUT,

Today Chas. Knott, a shoemaker residing on Virginia avenue, near 7th street southeast, entered the house of George Morris, at the corner of 3rd and K streets southeast, and asked Mrs. Morris to return a photograph which he had given the family. Mrs. Morris turned to get the picture, and as she did so Knott drew a revelver and shot her twice, the first ball tak-ing effect in her head and the second passing through her left lung. She ran wildly from the house screaming for help, the blood flowing freely from her wounds. A gentleman pass-ing by caught her in his arms as she was about to fall and carried her back to her house, where it was found that Knott, believing his victim dead, had committed suicide by blowing out his brains. He died instantly. CLEVELAND, O., July 9 .- The situa tion remained unchanged this morn-ing, so far as precautionary arrangements down town were concerned The Central Police Station was full of patrolmen and outside stood two our-horse coaches to carry men wherever needed. At the city armo-ry detachments of the Greys, light artillery, and the 5th Ohio, National guard, are on duty ready to move on call. At about 9 o'clock news reached the Central Station from the 18th ward that a procession of strikers numbering over eleven hundred had just left the corner of Broadway and Huron Street and were marching to-wards the city. A band of music was at their head and they were fly ing the stars and stripes. The men seemed undetermined what to do or where to go to.

A call for help was made from the screw works at the corner of Payne and Case avenues and forty policemen were sent in two omnibuses to the factory. 




